

### SEATTLE IS CHOSEN BY SHRINERS' CONCLAVE

MEN OF THE FEZ WILL MEET THERE NEXT YEAR BY UNANIMOUS DECISION.

Atlanta, Ga., May 13.—Frederick R. Smith of Danvers, N. C., was elected today imperial potentate of the Imperial council, nobles of the Mystic Shrine, at its annual conclave. Dr. Smith succeeds William W. Irwin of Wheeling, W. Va.

Seattle was chosen unanimously as the 1915 meeting place. The time for next year's meeting was set for the second Tuesday in July. The meeting will continue four days.

Other officers elected were: J. Putman Stevens, Portland, Me., deputy imperial potentate; Henry F. Niedringhaus, Jr., St. Louis, imperial chief rabban; William S. Brown, Pittsburgh, Pa., imperial treasurer; Benjamin W. Rowell, Boston, imperial recorder; Charles E. Ovenshire, Minneapolis, Minn., imperial assistant rabban; Elias J. Jacoby, Indianapolis, Ind., imperial assistant chief and prophet; William Kenrick, Philadelphia, imperial outer guard; Ellis J. Garretson, Tacoma, Wash., imperial first ceremonial master; J. W. Matthews, New York, having tendered his resignation as imperial marshal, Ernest A. Cutts of Savannah, Ga., was advanced two grades from captain of the guard to imperial second ceremonial master. For the same reason, James S. McCandless of Honolulu, was promoted two grades from imperial outer guard to imperial marshal.

Two officers, imperial captain of the guard and imperial outer guard, will be elected later.

### QUAKER CITY PAYS HER TRIBUTE TO TWO

PHILADELPHIA HONORS POINSETT AND SMITH OF THE VERMONT CRUZ VICTIMS.

Philadelphia, May 13.—A hundred thousand people honored two sons of Philadelphia today who died at Vera Cruz, George McKenzie Poinsett of the battleship Florida and Charles Allen Smith of the New Hampshire. It was the greatest public funeral held in Philadelphia since Abraham Lincoln's body lay in state in Independence hall. So great was the crush of people in Independence hall, where the sailors' bodies lay in state, that scores of women fainted. Two men were seriously injured, one of whom probably will die.

The funeral pageant was nearly an hour in passing. At head of the line were nearly a thousand bluejackets and marines from the Philadelphia navy yard.

All heads were bared and church bells along the route tolled as the bodies passed by.

The mourners and Mayor Blankenburg, and members of congress from Philadelphia followed. The rear of the military escort was composed of grand army men, Spanish war veterans and other military organizations.

Devorick. Ottumwa, Ia., May 13.—The body of Frank P. Devorick of Blakesburg, a marine of the U. S. Steamship South Carolina, who was killed at Vera Cruz, arrived today at the home of his foster parents near Blakesburg. A wreath of immortelles from the commander of the Atlantic fleet and a wreath of roses and sweet peas from the battleship Montana, accompanied the remains. The public funeral will be held tomorrow.

#### BY BANDITS.

Washington, May 12.—Sir Cecil Spring-Rice, the British ambassador, said today in regard to the two British subjects killed at Guadalajara, that latest advices indicate these men met their death at the hands of bandits, and, therefore, it is impossible to obtain any sort of redress, as neither the federals nor the constitutionalists can be held responsible.

#### FOR VERA CRUZ.

Norfolk, Va., May 12.—The battleship Wyoming, after taking on 200 additional bluejackets, sailed today from Hampton Roads for Vera Cruz. The gunboat Sacramento is taking on ammunition here and expects to leave Thursday for Vera Cruz.


