BY UNPARALLELED MARGIN VARSITY WINS TRIANGULAR FROM AGGIES AND MINERS

Ed Craighead of Varsity Individual Champion with Four First Places—Brown Wins Century and Furlong Dashes and Low Hurdles Race with Ease.

Deep buried lie the Farmer hopes this day, for yesterday afternoon a crippled varsity team scored a victory unparalleled for decisiveness over their rivals in the fastest college meet in the history of Montana.

Four records were broken and one equaled during the games, credit for two of the new marks going to the Aggies, for the other two to the varsity. Ingram, a freshman of the varsity, broke the record in the half mile, when he won the event in 2:06 2-5.

Steele a Wonder. Steele of the Aggies broke the two mile record in one of the prettiest races of the day. He covered the right laps in 10:34 2-5, after a wonderful sprint which carried him past Olander of Montana into victory.

Craighead Individual Champion. Individual honors for the meet go to E. B. Craighead, Jr., son of the president, who won four weight events. The big fellow had an unusually good day despite an injured arm and wasn't threatened by the Farmer weight-tossers.

Great Day for Brown. Jimmy Brown won three firsts in handy fashion, walking away with the century and furlong dashes and the low hurdles. Never before has Brown won a first place in a Montana interscholastic. His triumph yesterday was as thorough as his hard training deserved.

The meet was a little late and the stands were well filled when Director Carl Dickey led his "Farmer" band on the field. The university musicians were dressed in straw hats and linen dusters and won a good hand.

Four Records Are Broken During Most Brilliant College Meet Ever Held on Montana Field, Two Aggies Setting New Marks and Two Varsity Men.

Craighead Breaks Record. Craighead broke his own record in winning the discus hurl, throwing the weight 115 feet, 6 inches. He won the state college, was second and Wilcomb of the same team third.

Owsley Wins Broad Jump. Owsley won the broad jump by breaking his own state record of 21 feet with a leap of 21 feet, 10 inches. Gattion, the Farmer's heretofore champion, was second, with Connor of the Aggies third.

Steele of the Aggies furnished one of the most exciting races of the day when he ran the two-mile in the record-breaking time of 10:34 2-5. Led all the way round by Olander of the varsity, Steele started a sprint at the start of the last lap, the power of which sent him across the finish in record time. Olander stuck to the lead until the stretch, but there Steele passed him and romped home, a winner. The race was the more remarkable for the fact that it was the winner's first two-mile run.

High School Meet on Montana Field Will Start Today

At 2 o'clock this afternoon Governor Samuel V. Stewart will send down the straightaway on Montana field the entries in the first heat of the 50-yard dash, the opening event of the University of Montana's eleventh interscholastic games.

For the events today and tomorrow 243 of the chosen athletes of the state are entered. The athletic history of the state furnishes no parallel to this week's events. Scholastic history is in the making this afternoon. There will be no delay whatever in getting the meet started. The governor will send away the contestants when the clock in the tower of University Hall strikes 2.

Butte Leads Strongest. Working by the first method (and the first method has been successful on most occasions), Butte appears to be the winner. According to the second method Anaconda or Great Falls or Missoula will win.

Butte's pre-eminence is due to a Mr. Phelps, a certain colored sprinter with eloquent legs. Mr. Phelps seems due to win the three short dashes, at least, and if given any sort of assistance by his mates should win the meet hands down.

Much of the opposition which Phelps met a year ago is gone. Of the men who won the 125 points in last year's meet, the winners of but 59 points are coming back this year. Galtion's great total of 28 points has dwindled this year to 12. Missoula's score of 21 has shrunk, on paper, to 5. Butte's score stands unchanged at 14.

Should all of these men place according to their relation in last spring's results, the scores would be: Butte, 15; Galtion, 13; Great Falls, 13; Anaconda, 13; Missoula, 11; Victor, 5; Helena, 5. Butte's advantage is strengthened by the fact that Newman
