ANCIENT ARGUMENT RETURNS FOR MORE

"WOMEN SHOULDN'T PARADE," SAY THOSE WHO WOULD KEEP THEM AT HOME.

Washington, May 13.—Should women parade? Since the success of the May 2 demonstrations in which there were many parades by woman suffragists in all parts of the country, and in view of the fact that there are parades scheduled to be held in the future, many times has the question been asked, "Should women parade the streets, even for the cause of suffrage?"

As to those who are opposing equal rights at the ballot for women, the parades and activities of the women who are trying to secure the ballot have often been severely condemned and many caustic remarks have been made by anti-suffragists about women who will "get out on the streets, carry a banner, beat a drum, or do any one of the number of things which attracts attention, causes comment and gives publicity to what is being done."

"The congressional committee of the National American Woman Suffrage association," declared Mrs. Antoinette Funk, "indorses parades and all other methods which will help bring about the enfranchisement of one-half of the American citizenship. Under the constitution, peaceful assemblage and the right of petition is granted to all people regardless whether they are men or women. Parades are peaceful assemblages and women as well as men have the right to participate in them, beat their drums, carry their banners and go to meetings and utter their protests against disfranchisement."

"It is almost certain that never again in this country will there be any such disgraceful interruptions of the rights of American citizens as was permitted on March 3, 1913, in the national capital. Under the shadow of the dome of the capitol, in sight of the White House, on the historic avenue where all presidential parades take place, American citizens were denied the right of peaceful assemblage, peaceful march and peacefully to make their declarations and demand their rights."

"Methods which go beyond the rights of other people have never been approved by the national association. But it is a custom as old as politics to parade streets with bands and banners, and proclaim the cause for which an organization stands."

"That is what the suffragists of the United States have done and are doing and will continue to do. That is the way we show our strength, and show the intense interest which the women have in the struggle for enfranchisement. It is scarcely worth while to stop and reply to those who talk about it being 'unladylike' and 'undignified,' or 'not' anything else. This movement is a political game, like other movements controlled by politics. It has been scarcely worth while to reply to the criticisms that have been made against women parading for suffrage, and it is scarcely worth while now, save for the fact that parades and other methods which will help women to secure the ballot will be utilized in the future as in the past."
