Hamilton, May 25.—(Special.)—Hamilton defeated Corvallis yesterday on the Corvallis diamond by a score of 7 to 6, after one of the most sensational finishes ever made by a Corvallis team. Hamilton led for a time with a score of 6 to 0, which soon switched to 4 to 2 with Hamilton on the long end. Thus the score remained until the first half of the ninth inning when Hamilton scored three more runs.
