BOOSTS CHINA

EGGS

CONSULAR REPORTS SHOW THAT ORIENTAL POULTRY IS MIGHTY BUSY.

Washington, May 29.—The United States consul general at Shanghai, in a report to the state department, gives the following interesting details of the importation into the United States of Chinese eggs:

"Since January 1, 1914 (to date, March 25), over 62,000 cases of eggs (30 dozens to the case) invoiced at about \$287,000 United States currency, have been shipped from Shanghai to American Pacific coast ports.

"These shipments have been made principally by the northern steamship routes to Vancouver and Seattle, partly on account of the quick trans-shipment in the case of the Canadian Pacific ships, and in both cases for the reason that this northern route obviates the necessity for refrigeration facilities, at least during the colder months.

"The freight rates to Pacific coast ports via the regular lines is \$8 United States currency a ton (17 cases of eggs to the ton). Refrigerator space costs \$18 a ton. The advantage of shipments by the northern route is readily apparent. Shippers and ship-ping companies at Shanghai claim that the eggs have arrived in America in a highly satisfactory condition.

"Very few shipments have been made in refrigeration, but if the ex-ported eggs to the United States is to continue during the warmer weather the cargoes must be forward-ed in refrigerated space. The regular lines offer about 50 tons of refriger-ator space only. The Shiro line has recently put on new steamers to run on a monthly schedule to Pacific coast ports, and it is understood that the new ships will offer about 1,000 tons of refrigerator space. The space in the last steamer of this line which left Shanghai is understood to have been taken at \$10 United States cur-rency a ton.

"Some experiments are also being made here for the preserving of eggs in barrels with dry bran and a chemical preparation, but the success of these experiments and the profit-able character of such business if un-deraken can not now be determined."
