centive than loyalty to an incompetent leader.

That only two of 100 people fail because of immorality is a fine tribute to the teaching population. As a class, school teachers are honest, law-abiding, decent, self-respecting citizens. Generally speaking, their promises to pay are as good as their bonds and their words as good as their oaths. They may have their teaching vices, but they are as truly the custodians and expositors the exemplars of the social virtues, as any class of citizens.

The number who fail because of immoral conduct is almost negligible. It was argued recently that one's economic station and his moral practices are closely related, that a wage of \$8 less per week is directly contributory and responsible for many a mispent life. This indictment is fallacious when applied to teachers. Of the 400,000 women teaching in the public schools of this country 47.5 per cent, almost one-half, receive a wage, distributing their salaries over fifty (50) weeks to the year, of \$8 a week or less. And yet among no class can we find a larger percentage of virtuous people than among teachers.

In this hurried way I have enumerated some of the most important items as determining efficiency in teaching. Put in positive language the efficient teacher will be:

- 1. Good in instruction.
2. Dynamic in personality.
3. Interested in the work of teaching.
4. Strong and reasonable in discipline.
5. Sympathetic.
6. Co-operative.
7. Dominated by professional attitude.
8. A master of the subject.
9. Loyal.
10. Moral.
11. Loyal.

When considered with reference to the number of failures for which each of these is directly responsible, excellence in instruction is 20 times as important as health. By this I do not mean that good health is to be minimized. In fact, a high value is set upon it. But qualities such as health, personal appearance and a sense of humor are taken into consideration at the time teachers are employed. They are the qualities first noticed by the skillful superintendent—the qualities that rank highest in determining personality. Teaching selects healthy and good looking people. It is with these considerations in mind that one may successfully maintain that ability to instruct which is 10 times as valuable as one's moral disposition or 20 times as valuable as his health in determining efficiency. In the same way all the other qualities may be related and used as a rough scale. But briefly and arranged in order, ability to instruct is roughly, 12 as important as personality, 15 as important as interest in work, 16 as important as ability to control, 21 as important as sympathy, three times as important as co-operation, three times as important as professional spirit and scholarship, seven times as important as loyalty, 19.5 as morality and 20 times as health in determining general merit. This distribution should be applied only to those who are already engaged in teaching, and to prospective teachers. These qualities would appear in a different order and would bear different relations to each other in case we wished to apply them to candidates for teaching. But those who are already in service must rise or fall, succeed or fail accordingly as they embody these elements and express them in their daily school work. It may be argued that the use of such a scale after all depends upon the opinions of the judges. That is quite true. Nevertheless, it follows that the use of any scale, crude though it may be, is better than none at all, and whatever scale is used tends in the long run to refine the opinions of the user.

work. They are not envious or jealous of anyone, nor are they disloyal. They simply do not like the thing they are doing. They are not interested in the progress of the children nor in teaching as a profession. All too frequently they get to school just before the tardy bell sounds and are standing with hat and coat on at the front door ready to lead the children out at dismissal. They shirk their work and the responsibilities of their position. There is small hope for this class.

Disloyalty is one of the meanest of the school crimes. It takes the form of refusing to follow suggestions given by a superior officer, of speaking contemptuously of him or of his work, of sneering at the work of one's equals, of gossiping in a hypocritical way about the conduct of the school, of declining to attend meetings organized for professional improvement. Loyalty but not fealty, co-operation but not servility, every superintendent has a right to expect.

It is true that disloyalty is sometimes misinterpreted. That teacher or group of teachers who refuse to follow the dictates of a tyrant, or who refuse to acquiesce to the domineering methods of an ignoramus, are not disloyal. They consider the school system and the interests of the children as paramount to the desires of the superintendent. Loyalty to teaching, a profound reverence for child nature and its undeveloped potentialities, should serve as a more powerful guiding in-
