

NO PROGRESS MADE TOWARD CLEARING MARKET

DRIFT IS DOWNWARD BUT MOVEMENT IS NOT OF SERIOUS PROPORTIONS.

New York, June 15.—The judgment of the speculative community as to the stock market probabilities was held in abeyance today and price movements were narrow. No progress was made toward clearing up the questions overhanging the market blocking the way for bulls and bears alike.

The drift was downward but the movement did not attain important proportions. The weakest stocks in the list were the shares of the Gould firms.

Bonds were irregular. Total sales, par value, \$1,550,000. United States bonds were unchanged on call.
