## THIS MEETING SPELLS CLASS

## COLUMBIA IN LEAD BLACK AND WHITE IN A GREAT CONTEST

GOTHAM CREW WINS THE GREAT REGATTA EVENT WITH THE ITHACANS THIRD.

## PENNSYLVANIA SECOND

Four-Mile Contest Is a Thriller From Start to Finish the Winners Pulling Up by a Desperate Half-Mile Spurt at the End.

JOHNSON AND MORAN WILL PUNCH EACH OTHER FOR HEAVY-WEIGHT HONORS.

## SMOKE IS A FAVORITE

Betting in His Favor Is at Heavy Odds but Moran Is Said to Be in Perfect Condition and to Have Great Endurance.

Poughkeepsie, N. Y., June 26.—In a thrilling four-mile triangular struggle with Pennsylvania and Cornell, the Columbia university eight-oared crew won by a scant length the premier race of the twentieth annual regatta of the Intercollegiate Rowing association on the Highland course today.

Pennsylvania finished second, defeating Cornell by the length of its shell, with Syracuse, Washington and Wisconsin taking the wash of the leaders in the order named.

The official time of the crews was as follows:

Columbia, 19:37 4-5; Pennsylvania, 19:41; Cornell, 19:41 1-5; Syracuse, 19:59 2-5; Washington, 20:01 3-5; Wisconsin, 20:20.

Columbia's victory was the result of a desperate and sustained spurt in the final half mile. The Cornell crew, exhausted in trying to keep pace with the victors, faltered and slipped back into third place at the finish.

Historic forums attended the efforts of the Cornell junior varsity and freshmen eights, each combination in turn winning its race in impressive fashion.

The victory of the Columbia crew after 20 years' effort was extremely popular and tonight all Poughkeepsie celebrated the event in uproarious fashion. Not since 1895 when Columbia won the four-mile race, defeating Cornell and Pennsylvania in the initial regatta held on the Hudson river course, have the New York city university oarsmen showed the way to the finish line.

From the start the Pennsylvanians were a decided factor in the racing, rowing a deliberate but powerful and finished stroke throughout the major portion of the contest. The Quakers set the pace and refused to be shaken off by the repeated spurts of Columbia and Cornell. It was only in the last quarter mile that Pennsylvania relinquished her lead, and it appeared this was due more to a lack of fighting spirit than any superiority on the part of the winning eight.

Pennsylvania finished more like a machine than a combination of oarsmen, rowing steady and true, while Columbia and Cornell were fighting like wild men for the lead.

The race furnished an exciting spectacle for the 50,000 persons who lined the river banks and crowded the steamboats and yachts at the finish, despite the fact that Syracuse, last year's winner, and the two western crews, Wisconsin and Washington, were early eliminated by the hot pace.

The start was delayed when a Cornell oarsman jumped his slide in the first few strokes, and the six crews had to be recalled and sent away a second time. It was almost 7 o'clock, and twilight had settled upon the water under the frowning hillsides when Pennsylvania slashed its way into the lead during the first few strokes.

Although the stroke was comparatively slow, the Nickalls crew drove its shell through the water at a high speed. The start was showing the way by half a length over Cornell at the half-mile mark. Columbia and Syracuse were lapped for third place, while Wisconsin and Washington were fighting to keep out of last place.

With the eastern crews rowing a slower stroke than the westerners they continued to pull away. At the mile post Pennsylvania was in front with Cornell second and Columbia third. When the two-mile point was passed and half the race completed, the Quakers led by half a length over Cornell, with the Ithacan eight leading Columbia by a trifle more than that distance. Syracuse was fourth, Washington fifth and Wisconsin fast falling behind the Pacific coast champions.

After covering three miles, the real struggle for first place began. Columbia had fought her way into second place one-third of a length behind the Pennsylvania shell prow. Cornell was lapping the New York oarsmen. All three leaders were rowing 24 strokes to the minute, but Columbia was getting more drive and run than either rival. Cornell made its last effort at the three and one-half mile point, but failing to overhaul either Columbia or Pennsylvania, appeared to slowly lose power and gradually dropped back.

In the second varsity contest the Ithacan crew won by almost two lengths from Columbia. The official time: Cornell, 11:15 3-5; Columbia, 11:24 2-5; Pennsylvania, 11:33 3-5; Syracuse, 11:50 3-5.

The freshman two-mile race was even more pronounced victory for Cornell. The times were: Cornell, 10:26; Syracuse, 10:50 1-5; Pennsylvania, 10:53 2-5; Columbia, 10:56 1-5; Wisconsin, 10:59.

### HOPEFUL.

Washington, June 26.—Representatives of the Mexican constitutionalists in Washington, tonight expressed confident hopes that General Carranza would accept the invitation of the South American mediators at Niagara Falls to participate in informal conference to compose the internal affairs of Mexico.

Paris, June 26.—Jack Johnson, world's champion heavyweight pugilist, and Frank Moran of Pittsburgh, who hopes to wrest the title from the big negro, were early to bed tonight for a restful sleep before their 20-round battle in the amphitheater of the Velodrome d'Hiver tomorrow night.

Each man today declared himself physically fit for the fray and each was highly optimistic that victory would rest with him. Experts who have watched them in training bore out the assertions of the fighters that they were well prepared for the battle.

In the betting tonight the negro was a 3 to 1 favorite. Moran had only light exercise this morning and spent the remainder of the forenoon looting about his training quarters at Meriel-on-the-Else and in picking wild flowers in the nearby wood. This afternoon he came into the city for an examination by physicians, who declared him to be physically perfect. The doctors expressed great admiration over the muscular development of the white man and the regularity of the action of his heart.

Johnson did his usual morning run on the road near his camp at Anieres, before a large crowd in his gymnasium Johnson donned the gloves with his trainers this afternoon. He purposely extended by several rounds his customary five-round training bout to test his condition thoroughly, taking on successively three boxers for several rounds each. He also went through part of his regular indoor exercise.

Everybody in Moran's camp was cheerful tonight and confident that he would win. Their confidence, they said, was due to the constant improvement Moran had shown during his training—in offensive and defensive work, hard hitting and ability to take punishment.

Willie Lewis, the American middleweight, who has been helping to condition Moran, in order to toughen the challenger, has been making Moran stand with hands at his sides and with legs braced while Lewis rained blows to his jaw trying to knock him down.

Johnson also has trained assiduously, if not quite so strenuously. He began his work two weeks earlier than Moran and has been careful not to overdo it. He said today that he was prepared to adapt himself to the tactics of Moran.

Under the rules hitting in the clinches will be permissible.


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
