THIS MEETING SPELLS CLASS

RECEIVER IS ASKED FOR MURRAY CLUB

PRESIDENT IS INDIGNANT AND SAYS SITUATION DOES NOT WARRANT IT.

Salt Lake, June 27. (Special).—Salt Lake to have a receiver appointed for the Murray baseball club was filed in the district court today by the Utah Association of Credit Men. It is alleged that the club is insolvent and unable to pay its bills. To insure payment of bills aggregating \$54.75, which have been assigned to the association for collection, the plaintiff expects to have a receiver appointed to handle the club's receipts from the baseball games in the future.

"This action is not only premature, but it appears to be entirely unnecessary," tonight declared Dr. C. P. Harville, president of the Murray club. "The Murray club has a number of players who are wanted by other teams, and the sale of even two would make the club absolutely solvent. The bills this action was brought upon have been running only a short time, and certainly we never looked for any lawsuit to enforce their collection."

"We have had miserable weather from a baseball standpoint. Today was the first Saturday when the weather permitted any crowd of considerable size to attend. In fact, the weather has been worse for us than for all the other clubs in the circuit combined. Under these circumstances we did not do as well on the gates as we had warrant for expecting. Nevertheless we have been able to meet our obligations in a manner that was generally satisfactory to our creditors. Our players have been paid their salaries in full on each pay day, the 15th and 30th of each month."

"The suit is entirely unnecessary, and I hope the patrons of the game will not let the hasty action of the creditors' association to give them a wrong impression. There is still outstanding a considerable amount of subscriptions to our stock. I think the whole thing will be satisfactorily adjusted Monday."

BERLIN EXPERIENCES WILSON PSYCHOLOGY

Berlin, June 27.—The population of greater Berlin is growing at a slower rate since the present period of business depression set in. It increased last year by only 50,000, whereas the gain had been 108,100 for 1912, and 119,000 for 1911. Berlin itself actually lost population in 1913 for the first time in very many years. The reduction was about 16,000, whereas the previous rate of gain had been about 12,000 a year. That the change in prosperity was the cause of this movement in population is evident from the fact that the number of concerns in greater Berlin employing as many as 25 persons was reduced in 1913 by 18,000.
