SOCIALISTS SCORED FOR INSULT TO KING. Berlin, June 27.—It is several weeks since the reichstag was closed, but the action of the socialists in remaining seated while the usual cheers for the emperor were given is still the subject of much sympathy here.

The North German Gazette, undoubtedly speaking for the government, declares that the next reichstag must take measures to prevent a repetition of such public insults to the emperor.

In the Prussian diet, the conservatives interpellated on the matter, desiring to know whether the prosecuting attorney's office had been asked to proceed against the socialists for lese majeste, or whether it intended to take such action.

Replying, the minister of justice, while he severely criticized the action of the socialists, declared that he doubted greatly whether it would be possible to get convictions, since it would probably be held that the giving of the customary cheers for the emperor constituted a part of the reichstag proceedings. The imperial constitution provides that deputies may not be brought to account for their actions or utterances in the reichstag.

An acquittal, said the minister, would place the socialists in the light of victors, and a conviction would make them appear martyrs. In either case the result could not benefit the state and it had been therefore decided to take no notice of it.

In 1904 the elder Liebknecht refused to rise when cheers were proposed for the emperor in the reichstag. The authorities prepared a complaint against him and asked the reichstag to consent to his prosecution. Consent was refused and the case had to be dropped. There appears to be considerable doubt, in any event, whether a mere refusal or neglect to stand up when the emperor is being cheered is sufficient to constitute the crime of lese majeste.

Indications of a sharpening of the campaign against the socialists are observable in many places throughout the empire. The police authorities are particularly active against the so-called "workmen's gymnastic societies." They proceed by declaring them political associations out of hand, and acting under this declaration, they forbid members from attending them.

The socialists maintain that these associations are non-political and devoted entirely to gymnastic work, but the police have been able to bring evidence enough to satisfy the courts, in all cases thus far carried to the courts, that the associations are a part of the party propaganda for winning recruits among the young.

GERMANY'S INTEREST IN OLYMPIC GAMES. Berlin, June 27.—The interest that German sporting circles are taking in the Olympic games to be held in Berlin in 1916 is reflected in a remarkable increase in the organizations of the turners. The annual report of the national organization shows that 450 new clubs with a membership of 55,000 joined it in the course of the year. The general organization now consists of 11,000 clubs, having a total membership of 1,400,000.

The turners are trying to induce the military authorities to prescribe a certain minimum degree of physical development to entitle recruits to lighter military exercises. As a great part of the military drill, particularly in the first year is designed merely to develop physical strength, the turners argue that much of this could be dispensed with in the case of the young men who have already made themselves strong through systematic exercise, and they believe that the exemptions asked for would give a great impetus to their organizations.
