Decision for Chase Will Be Given Soon

Buffalo, N. Y., July 10.—A decision on the plea to dissolve the injunction restraining Hal Chase, former first baseman of the Chicago American league club, was promised on July 18 by Justice Herbert P. Bissell at the close of arguments here today.

"If this injunction is to be dissolved it should be done promptly," he said.

The grounds upon which Chase's personal attorney and counsel for the Federal league sought a dissolution of the injunction was based largely upon the allegation that the Chicago team did not come into court with clean hands, because, as a member of organized baseball, it is operating in violation of the Sherman and trust laws.

OUR OWN ATHLETES IN DENMARK DO WELL

AGAINST DANES GERMANS, FINNS AND SWEDES THEY SCORE.

WE WIN RELAY EVENT

In the Sprints and Hurdles Our Colors Are Carried to the Fore and Oler Takes the High Jump With Ease.

Copenhagen, July 10.—The American athletes won in several of the finals in the games at the stadium tonight against representatives of Denmark, Germany, Sweden and Finland.

Homer Baker, New York Athletic club, won the 400-meters race in 52 3-10 seconds.

W. M. Oler, Jr., captured the 110-meters hurdle event in 16 2-5 seconds.

J. C. Patterson, University of Pennsylvania, won the 200-meters in 22 2-5 seconds and the 100-meters in 11 1-10 seconds. Oler won the high jump with 1.82 meters (5 feet 11 1-2 inches).

The one-mile relay race, teams of five men, was won by the Americans in 4 minutes 33 seconds.

AERONAUTS PLACED FOR BALLOON CONTEST

CAPTAIN PRESTON OF THE GOOD-YEAR WINS COVETED PLACE AND WILL START LAST.

St. Louis, July 10.—The balloon "Goodyear," piloted by Captain R. A. D. Preston of Akron, Ohio, won the coveted place in the drawing today for starting position in the national elimination balloon race that will start here tomorrow. This balloon will start last, and therefore, will be considered as having an advantage in the race because of the greater lifting power of its gas, which will be under the leading rays of the sun for a longer time before ascent than will the gas in the balloons that start earlier.

The order in which the balloons will start and their pilots and aides follow:

First—Balloon Hoosier; pilot, Warren Ransor, Brookville, Ohio; aide, Herbert Ransor, his son.

Second—Balloon America III; pilot, Dr. Jerome Kingsbury, New York; aide, Clarence C. Woodman, Philadelphia.

Third—Balloon San Francisco 1913; pilot, E. S. Cole, St. Louis; aide, R. E. Emerson, Springfield, Mo.

Fourth—Balloon Uncle Sam; pilot, Paul J. McElough, St. Louis; aide, William Trafts, St. Louis.

Fifth—Balloon "Miss Sofia"; pilot, William Assmann, St. Louis; no aide.

Sixth—Balloon Aero Club of St. Louis; pilot, John Barry, St. Louis; aide, Albert von Hoffman, Jr., St. Louis.

Seventh—Balloon Kansas City III; pilot, John Watts, Kansas City; aide, W. F. Coonstock, Kansas City.

Eighth—Balloon Pennsylvania; pilot, Arthur T. Atherton, Philadelphia; aide, Philip Sharples, Philadelphia.

Ninth—Balloon Goodyear; pilot, R. A. D. Preston, Akron, Ohio; aide, M. D. Treanlin, Akron.

Tenth—Balloon New York; pilot, John Berry, St. Louis; aide, John Hoffman, both of St. Louis, had offered a silver trophy to the aeronaut who will eclipse a flight of 820 miles in America which Berry and Von Hoffman made from San Antonio, Texas. This trophy may be competed for by any licensed aeronaut, American or foreign. The winner can hold it for three years, unless his record is surpassed meanwhile by some other aeronaut. The trophy, however, will not be available for competition in the race tomorrow.

The pennant race in the American league has tightened up all along the line and the world's champion Athletics will have to go some in order to repeat.
