## RECORD IS BROKEN AT CLEVELAND RACES

ETAWAH III TROTS MILE IN 2:04 SETTING NEW WORLD MARK.

## GEERS DRIVES IN RACE

Famous Trainer Sits Behind Record-Breaker and Also Drives Anvil in the Fastest Mile Trotted This Season.

Cleveland, July 22.—In a special event this afternoon at the third day's grand circuit races at North Randall, Etawah III, owned by Frank G. Jones of Memphis, trotting a mile in 2:04, established a world's record for a four-year-old trotter of either sex. The old record was 2:05 1/4, made in 1913 by Directum. Geers drove Etawah and was paced by runners. In the morning Geers drove Anvil, another Jones horse, a mile in 2:02 3/4, the fastest mile trotted this season. Anvil also became the fastest record trotter in training.

Geers drove Napoleon Direct to victory in the heat pace of the meet so far, the last event of the day. Six heats were required to pick the winner in the 2:12 pace. After Shadell had captured the first, Napoleon Direct took the second and the third. Then Costless Mabel came to the front and won the next two heats. Napoleon Direct, however, outsprinted Costless Mabel in a thrilling brush down the stretch and took the last heat and the race.

The second event of the afternoon, the North Randall stake for 2:20 class trotters, also furnished several surprises. Margaret Draven, the favorite, captured the first two heats without much trouble. Sienna, who had run third and second, respectively, in the first two heats, came back strong and captured the next three and the race, in the second heat Geers drove the Guide in third, being the first time Geers has shown this season.

## Defenders of Davis Cup Selected by Committee

McLoughlin, Williams, Bundy and Behr Chosen to Defend Tennis Trophy Won Last Year by Former Pair.

New York, July 22.—Official announcement was made tonight that M. E. McLoughlin, R. Norris Williams II, T. C. Bundy and Karl H. Behr would comprise the American team to defend the Dwight F. Davis international tennis trophy. The nominations were made by R. D. Wrenn, G. T. Adee and H. W. Stocum, the committee, in accordance with the international cup regulations.

Maurice E. McLoughlin, whose home is San Francisco, was twice holder of the national singles championship, and with Bundy holds also the title in doubles. He was a member of the cup-winning team of last year, and is 23 years old.

R. Norris Williams II of Philadelphia was second in the singles on the international team last year. He also is 23 years old. Karl H. Behr, New York, first held a place on an international team in 1907. With Beals Wright as his partner, he beat N. P. Brooks and A. F. Wilding, the Australians, at Wimbledon in that year. Since that time Behr has been considered one of the best players in this country. He is 29 years old. Thomas C. Bundy of Los Angeles played on the Davis cup team of 1911 as partner of R. D. Little. In 1910 he rated No. 2 to W. A. Larned, and he is joint holder with McLoughlin of the national doubles championship. He is 24 years old.
