FIREMEN SUCCEED IN STOPPING BLAZE AND NOW HAVE BED OF COALS CONTROLLED.

The Missoula fire department, the Northern Pacific fire crew and the auxiliary force, making about 75 men altogether, succeeded in saving about one-half of the wood in the Polleys Lumber company's yard from the flames which threatened to take the whole pile at an early hour yesterday morning.

It is believed that the firemen have complete control of the situation and that the mill or lumber yards are no longer in danger.



AMERICAN REGISTRY FOR FOREIGN VESSELS

AN EMERGENCY BILL WILL GO BEFORE CONGRESS MONDAY FOR THIS PURPOSE.

Washington, Aug. 1.—To save transatlantic shipping from paralysis during the European crisis and avert a threatened blockade of America's bumper crops, President Wilson and congressional leaders today agreed upon an amendment to the Panama act which will permit foreign ships to come under American registry.

The bill would eliminate the requirement that a ship must be five years old to get the American registry, would authorize the president to suspend the requirement that all watch officers must be Americans and suspend the requirement of survey, inspection and measurements of foreign built vessels admitted to American registry.
