OVER THE DIVIDE FIRES BURN IN IDAHO

FOREST SERVICE CALLED UPON FOR MORE MEN AND SITUATION IS NO BETTER

Over in Idaho, the forest fire situation did not improve any yesterday and District Forester Silcox has sent more experienced men into the district to get in closer touch with details and has decided to take over a big section of the country—a strip just over the divide 18 miles wide and extending 70 miles south of the Lolo pass—look after the fires from the Montana side.

This district is very rough and especially inaccessible from the Idaho side. A crew of 25 men and 15 pack animals was sent into the Selway forest yesterday, leaving Cono in the Bitter Root and taking the Lost Horse pass trail to Indian lake.

On the Selway and the Clearwater forest, which adjoins it on the north, fires have been numerous during the last two days. Logging Engineer Dorr Skeels, who went into the field from Kootenai, Idaho, sent a message yesterday stating that there had been a total of 45 fires and that 20 of these were still burning, partly under control. Lightning has been bad and has caused the majority of the fires there.

To handle the territory described above from the Montana side, Assistant Forester C. H. Adams has been sent to Elks' Summit station, which is about the geographical center and which has telephone connections through the forests and with Hamilton, where connections can be made to Missoula. Mr. Adams makes the trip through the Lolo pass and will have a chance to size up the situation through the northern part of this strip.

E. F. White will go to the same station from the other end, leaving Darby today and crossing through Lost Horse pass. Then Wilkinson will open a commissary department at Darby and supply equipment, pack horses and men for fighting operations. Four horses were secured in the Bitter Root yesterday to be held in reserve for packing into this territory.

CANDIDATES ENTER RACE FOR LOCAL COUNTY JOBS

SEVEN BULL MOOSERS ARE OUT AND SOME OF OTHER PARTIES HAVE FILED PETITIONS

Tuesday was field day for the militant Bull Moosers of Missoula county. Seven petitions for nominations on the progressive ticket were filed with the county clerk. They include that of state senator, member of the legislature, sheriff, treasurer, assessor, clerk and recorder and auditor.

The prospective candidates are:
For senator, J. R. Latimer.
For the house, Carl E. Cameron.
For sheriff, W. H. Houston.
For assessor, J. B. Henley.
For treasurer, W. P. McClay.
For clerk and recorder, Dan H. Ross.
For auditor, Fred J. Murray.

Following the provision of the primary law and the custom of candidates for nomination, their individual platform declarations are:
Latimer for senator: "Represent the people of Missoula county to the best of my ability."
Cameron for the house: "Abide by the principles of progressivism, studiously laboring in the interest of the commonwealth and with an eye single to the promotion of prosperity in Montana, dedicate my highest efforts to any honest, faithful and strenuous discharge of the trust reposed in me by the people of Missoula county."
Murray for auditor: "Discharge the duties thereof with fidelity."
Houston for sheriff: "Administer the same with strict economy, looking solely to the interests of the overburdened taxpayers of Missoula county."
Henley for treasurer: "Do my duty."
McClay for assessor: "Perform the duties of the office of county assessor fairly and impartially and with equal justice to all."

Ross for clerk: "Give the people of Missoula county a fair, equitable, economical and efficient administration of the affairs of the office of clerk and recorder."
Mr. Latimer is one of the pioneers of Missoula county. He has served in the Montana legislature and also as county commissioner.

Mr. Cameron is Missoula county born, he graduated from the Missoula high school in 1899, from the University of Montana in 1913, and from the law school in 1914.
Mr. Houston has heretofore served as sheriff of Missoula county and is now serving his second term as one of the commissioners of the city. Until the advent of the present socialist city administration he had been in charge of the police department of the city.

Mr. Henley has been engaged in the grocery business for several years. He is a bookkeeper by profession and was elected at the last election as a member of the legislature from this county.

Mr. McClay is one of the pioneers of the county. He has been engaged in farming all his life, until the past two years, when he moved into the city.
Mr. Ross is at present engaged in the insurance business. He has served as postmaster of Missoula and also as police magistrate of the city.

Mr. Murray is a bookkeeper by profession. He has lived most of his entire life in Missoula. His father, during his life time, was yard master for the Northern Pacific. For several years Mr. Murray has been on the business office staff of The Missoulian Publishing company.

It is understood that more petitions for nomination on the progressive party ticket will be filed tomorrow.

In addition to the progressive candidates to file petitions others were brought in as follows: W. W. Berry, democrat for state senator; William L. Murphy, republican, for state senator; R. W. Angevine, republican for sheriff.

Mr. Berry was once a state representative. He is one of the best known conductors on the Rocky Mountain division of the Northern Pacific.

Mr. Murphy is one of the best known attorneys in western Montana. His home has been in Missoula for many years. At present he is a member of the law firm of Bickford & Murphy.
R. W. Angevine's record is too well known in Missoula to need any "introduction." He was once chief of police and later street commissioner for the city.

NO CHANGE RESULTS FROM CANVASS OF VOTE

COMMISSIONERS CHECK POLL BOOKS BUT THERE IS NO MATERIAL CHANGE

The county commissioners canvassed the election returns from Mineral county yesterday. All of the books from the judges were received during the forenoon and the work was started at once. Good progress was made and the checking of each poll book was completed before the board adjourned.

While there were a few errors found in the reports that had been sent in over the telephone, the general results will not be altered and the selection of county seat and officers will stand as at first announced.

The commissioners will pass a resolution, probably this morning declaring the county of Mineral created and that it has selected Superior as a temporary county seat, and then indicate the officers elected. Certificates of election will also be prepared and signed for the new officers immediately.
