


Were The Days of Gladiators in Rome Worse Than Our Auto Races?

United States Tennisers Learn Lesson in Defeat and Will Practice Doubles

In seasons to come American tennis fans will see a greater efficiency in the team that defends the Davis cup in doubles. For it was in the doubles play that the American team this year made a sorry showing and their adversaries from the antipodes romped gaily away with the cherished trophy tucked carefully under their arms.

Brookes and Wilding, the Australians, were able to pursue McLoughlin and Bundy all over the courts and the reason seems to be that they have studied doubles play in a way that no other team has ever done. They have worked together till their play has reached a mechanical perfection that is unbeatable and it can be truly said that their doubles play is as fast and faultless as their individual singles. More, they both feel a great en-

thusiasm in their doubles and play them with as great an interest as they do their singles matches. This cannot be said of the Americans.

American tennis stars aspire to individual honors. McLoughlin, our bright particular luminary, cares not a rap for doubles play. Such was always true of William Larner. McLoughlin plays doubles as a matter of necessity and because it's a part of the program.

Wilding and Brookes, however, have never neglected the doubles end of the game and in fact, noting the weakness of most of their opponents in this department, they have cultivated it to the degree that they are far and away the most finished team the game has ever seen. In their recent set-to with the Americans they clearly displayed the wisdom of devoting to doubles a careful study. The

fact that their American combatants were quite a bit younger in years put them at not the least disadvantage. There is not the ground to be covered in doubles and they do not tax as greatly the player's stamina and strength.

American tennisers have learned a lesson from the Australians this year and in future tournaments they hope to be able to offer stouter opposition. It has been suggested that William Larner, though now somewhat along in years, is still able to play a fast and snappy game and with McLoughlin would make a doubles team to perplex even the brilliant Australians. Should McLoughlin and Larner forego and bend their energies to the perfecting of fast doubles play there is little doubt that another season our Davis cup would not be carted away in such an easy fashion.

TENNIS CONTEST FOR THE STATE FAIR PROPOSED

FOLLOWERS OF THE NET GAME IN HELENA DESIRE TEAMS FROM OTHER CITIES

A plan to have a tennis tournament at Helena during the time of the state fair is being worked out by the net enthusiasts of the Capital city. The scheme, according to the information received here, is to have teams from Missoula, Great Falls, Butte and Helena enter in the contests and to have the games extend over several days of fair week.

There is much interest in the net game in Helena and Dr. Cole, who is pushing the plan, declares that he believes there are enough interested in each town to warrant a fair-time tournament. The idea is to pick the best players from each club and play the games in the morning. The contests would be purely for pleasure and would, in a measure, decide the tennis supremacy of the towns concerned.

The plan, it is said, has received hearty co-operation from the Great Falls and Butte men. The invitation is open to Missoula and it is believed that a team can be secured from here. Helena boasts some of the best tennis courts in the state and such a tournament as that proposed by Dr. Cole would undoubtedly be an added attraction to the state for a large number of persons.

Bridegroom of Two Months Meets Death While Traveling at About 80 Miles Per Hour—De Palma Is Winner.

Elgin, Ill., Aug. 22.—The Elgin national road race today, which, like that of yesterday, was won by Ralph De Palma, developed into a tragedy. Spencer Wishart, the wealthy young Philadelphia driver, and a bridegroom of only two months, meeting his death, his mechanic, John C. Jenter, a New Jersey boy, was probably fatally injured.

Wishart was leading the race, closely pressed by Burman. He was driving with his accustomed indifference to danger at an estimated rate of 80 miles an hour. In trying to pass the machine ahead of him on the 13th lap, the hubs of the two machines came together. Wishart's machine crashed into a fence and turned over, landing him beneath it. His right leg was broken, his skull fractured and his chest crushed. He was hurried to a hospital, where he died in the presence of his bride, who until two months ago was Miss Louise McGowan of a wealthy Indianapolis family.

Jenter was thrown from the car back onto the track 100 feet from where the car overturned. Milkmen dragged him from the course out of the way of other machines, which were not halted by the tragedy. He also was taken to the hospital, where it was said tonight his chance of recovery was slight. His right arm was broken and he suffered internal injuries. Four spectators were slightly injured, mostly in the way of bruises, when the car hit the fence.

A dinner which was to have been given the drivers in Chicago tonight was cancelled and the accident cast a cloud over De Palma's remarkable performance.

Yesterday this driver beat the field over the 391-mile course at an average speed of 75.6 miles. This was a race for cars of 450 cubic inches displacement or under. Today's race was a free-for-all with 24 starters, only five of them were figuring in the race at the close and again De Palma was ahead, his average speed being 73.5 miles, or one-tenth of a mile slower than his previous performance, which was a new record for the course.

Wishart's ill luck began yesterday. He was leading for most of the race until a leak developed in his gas tank and put him out of it.

ON GRAND CIRCUIT NEW RECORD IS SET

ANNA BRADFORD GOES MILE IN 2:03 3/4 WHICH IS FASTEST EVER FOR A 3-YEAR OLD

Pittsburgh, Aug. 22.—Anna Bradford, the black filly by Todd Mac, featured the closing day of the Grand circuit meeting on the Brimona island track here by locating the world's record for three-year-olds on a mile track. The Kentucky filly, without coming from her driver, F. W. Murphy, circled the track in the second heat of the pace for three-year-olds, in 2:03 3/4. Last week at Kalamazoo, Anna Bradford equaled the record for three-year-old fillies. The mile record for three-year-olds had been held by William, which set the mark at 2:05 last summer. The track was rather heavy from yesterday's rain.

The 2:12 pace, valued at \$1,000, furnished the best race of the afternoon. It took six heats to decide the winner. Sellers D. took the first heat and Don Patch took the third and fourth heats. Little Bernice, after winning the second heat, showed great staying powers and took the fifth and sixth heats.

Fair Virginia won the 2:24 trot in straight heats without trouble. The pace for three-year-olds went to Anna Bradford, which won the first heat in 2:06 and the second in 2:03 1/4.
