MILK PAIL AND BUTTER PADDLE

It is evident that the monthly pay roll from the dairy cow is becoming, more and more, a real factor in western Montana.

Yesterday, a delegation of Bitter Root bankers, returning from the Butte meeting, were discussing the dairy situation in Ravalli county.

The testimony of these men, who are in a position to know the real facts in the case, is to the effect that about \$20,000 per month is now being paid out to Ravalli county farmers for milk and cream.

These gentlemen approximated the monthly distribution of these pay checks to the different localities, as follows:

Table listing monthly distribution of pay checks to various localities: Stevensville creamery (\$10,000), Hamilton, stock farm creamery (2,500), etc.

Total \$20,000

That means a quarter of a million dollars distributed this year to the thrifty dairy farmers of the Bitter Root valley.

The testimony of each of these bankers is that the shipment of full blooded and high grade dairy cattle into the valley is constantly increasing.

Ravalli county can easily quadruple its present product of milk and cream, without disturbing its present output of fruit, grain and vegetables.

That will mean a million dollar milk roll. The monthly distribution of pay checks for milk and cream is creating a changed economic situation in the valley.

Instead of waiting a whole year for returns from his industry, in the shape of fall sales of wheat, hay, apples and potatoes and in return the yearly settlement with the local merchants, the milk farmer is able to pay his bills every thirty days.

This puts him on a cash buying basis. The change from yearly to monthly settlement of accounts will mean a saving to him of not less than ten per cent on the cost of his store supplies.

The merchant cannot carry an account for a year and sell as cheaply as when his goods are sold on a thirty day cash basis.

"I have never yet seen a farmer, who only raised and sold grain, that did not die poor. The farmer who raises and sells live stock will make some money, while the farmer who turns the product of his land into butter fat will become rich."

This man at 64 had raised a family, giving his children a good education and had accumulated about \$100,000.

This he had done by pursuing the policy outlined in his homely philosophy above quoted.

Every day we are learning the lesson that in the milk pail and the butter paddle lies the future prosperity of the people of western Montana.

VEAL LOAF.
