

AUSTRIAN OFFICIAL TAKES SLAP AT A CARDINAL

DENIES HIS EMINENCE SAFE CONDUCT BECAUSE HE WILL NOT DENY ATROCITIES

London, Sept. 4, 11:27 p. m.—Cardinal Mercier, archbishop of Malines, and Cardinal Amette, archbishop of Paris, are returning to the French capital together from the conclave in Rome, according to a Central News dispatch from Paris. It is announced, the dispatch says, that Cardinal Mercier declined to accede to the request made by the Austro-Hungarian ambassador at Rome that he should deny reports of German barbarities. The ambassador thereupon refused to accord his eminence safe conduct for the return journey to Malines.

"The retreat of the enemy after his defeat at Lemberg was a panic, and the Russians took 200 guns, and tens of thousands of prisoners. It is believed that the remnants of the second Austrian army is no longer of military value. "On September 2, when the Russians were drawing up within cannon shot of Lemberg, the surrounding forts did not stop this advance. The same day Lemberg was closely surrounded by Russian troops and was captured, with enormous quantities of war materials. All the buildings in town were packed with Austrian wounded, who had been abandoned in the flight. Beside the military importance of Lemberg as the center of Galicia, its capture is very important from a strategic point of view as it constitutes a great railway junction, commanding the lines leading to the rear of the Austrian army, which is now halted in line with Opole, Gornostie and Belz. "The capture of Lemberg will enable the Russian army to push forward with still greater intensity."

PARIS CAN RESIST SIEGE, IT IS SAID

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Bruyeres and the Chailion fort and batteries. South of the city is the row of forts at Ivry, Bietre, Mont Rouge, Vanves and Issy. North and east of the city are three great forts around St. Denis, and two others at Fort Aubervilliers and Fort Charenton, commanding the approaches from the great wood of Bondy. The forts of the outer circle, which are of the most modern type, have from 24 to 60 heavy guns and 600 to 11,200 men each. In all, the three lines of defenses require 170,000 men to operate them, not counting troops assembled within the city. According to military experts, it would require a force of 500,000 men to invest these defenses. MUST GIVE UP GUNS Philadelphia, Sept. 4.—The American liner Merion, which arrived here on Tuesday with four six-inch guns mounted on her decks will be stripped of her armament before she sails tomorrow on the return trip to Liverpool. On the advice of the British ambassador at Washington it was decided that the guns be hauled and placed in the care of Commandant Benson at the Philadelphia navy yard.

MEXICAN FACTIONS CALLED TO MEET ON OCTOBER 1

HOUSES IN CAPITAL SEARCHED FOR ARMS AND MANY ARRESTS ARE MADE

Mexico City, Sept. 4.—October 1 is fixed by General Carranza for a general convention on the plan of Guadalupe and the compact of Torreon. At that time the governors of the various states, military commanders and one delegate for every thousand men under arms, will meet here to name the date for the general elections and decide upon platform reforms. Many houses are being searched for arms and numerous arrests have been made.

LAW OF WAR VIOLATED.

London, Sept. 4.—A dispatch from Ostend says the German governor of Brussels is forcing the members of the civil guard who have been disarmed to assist in carrying out the defensive preparations. It is contended that this is a violation of the laws of war.

AMERICANS ARRIVE IN ENGLAND ON CRUISER

THEY REPORT THAT GERMANY'S AIRSHIPS ARE SEEN OVER MANY FRENCH CITIES

London, Sept. 4.—The failure of Southampton port officials to advise the officers of the American cruiser Tennessee that she could dock there was responsible for the unexpected landing of the cruiser at Weymouth today with 300 refugees from Havre. The cruiser now has been ordered to act as a ferry between France and England.

The Tennessee's passengers reported that German airships had been seen over many French cities. They said there were numerous delays of trains near the outside of Paris forts because of the preparations for defense and the tearing down of houses to make way for clear gun fire from the outside fortifications of Paris.

BRECKENRIDGE IN PARIS

Paris, Sept. 4.—Henry S. Breckenridge, assistant secretary of war, who came to Europe on board the United States cruiser Tennessee in connection with relief work, arrived here from Vienna today homeward bound.

LOOKS LIKE ALLIANCE

London, Sept. 4.—A Renter dispatch from Constantinople, dated August 28, and arriving here by an indirect route, says that the German crews of the former German cruisers Goeben and Breslau are still on board those vessels.

MILITARY TO RULE

Petrograd, Sept. 4.—Grand Duke Nicholas, commander in chief of the Russian forces, has issued a general order providing for the military administration of all foreign territory as fast as it is occupied by the Russian troops.

BATTLE IN AIR

Bordeaux, via London, Sept. 4.—The Petite Gironde says that when a German aeroplane tried to approach Paris today it was wrecked near Vincennes by two French airmen. The French aviators sent a charge of grape shot into the wings of the German machine.

FRANCIS OUMET WINS EXCITING GOLF MATCH

IN A CLOSE CONTEST WITH FOWNES, FORMER TITLE HOLDER JUST NOSES OUT

Manchester, Vt., Sept. 4.—The Oumet-Fownes match produced better golf and was far more exciting than the contest between the two metropolitan veterans. Only once did either Oumet or Fownes have an advantage of more than a single hole, and that was when Oumet won three in succession in the afternoon round, only to lose them immediately. Styemies played an important part in the match, Fownes laying three of them for his opponent. On one of them Oumet pulled past Fownes' ball and took a half. With a lead of one up and two to play Fownes missed a two-foot putt on the 17th green, which evened up the score and then lost the contest on the next hole by slicing into the rough on his second.

FOOD DEALERS FACE FEDERAL INDICTMENT

Washington, Sept. 4.—Thirty-one food dealers were indicted here today by a federal grand jury under the Sherman laws on counts charging price fixing. All the indicted men are local produce dealers or commission merchants. At the department of justice it was said government agents working in many states for evidence of price fixing were expected to make reports soon which officials hoped would be the basis of other indictments.

BUTTE IS SETTLING DOWN TO NORMAL INDUSTRY

MAYOR DUNCAN FEELS IRON HAND OF CENSOR ON SOCIALIST PAPER

Butte, Sept. 4 (midnight).—The city was quiet today. The mines, which have been operating recently worked uninterruptedly and the miners, whether they belonged to either faction, were not molested. Militiamen not on duty were granted permission for the first time to move beyond the guard lines, providing two or more were together. Major Donohue directed the municipal authorities to continue all functions of the city government except the police department, which is now in charge of Provost Marshall Conley.

The weekly socialist paper, edited by Mayor Lewis J. Duncan, of Butte, appeared on the street tonight with five and one-half columns of blank space. In the blanks were the words, "Censored by Official Censor of Montana State National Guard." Major Donohue in establishing the censorship announced that the following would be prohibited: Publication of inflammatory matter; attacks on state and national governments; criticism of the military and disrespectful articles about the flag; No editorial or news matter of the local papers has yet been censored.

A Riot Call Butte, Sept. 4.—(6 p. m.)—A riot call, occasioned by a report that a body of men was marching on the Mountain View mine, presumably for the purpose of dynamite the property, startled the city at 4:30 o'clock this morning and gave the officers and 600 members of the Montana state guard their first real touch of military life since the district has been under martial law.

Seven Minutes.

In seven minutes the 600 soldiers were up from their beds, ready to march onto the scene of trouble under the direction of Major Donohue, commander of the military, and Lieutenant Baker and Captain Connelly. The 25 sentries on duty in front of the building had already been augmented by 50 reserve guards. The two gatling guns maintained on the streets were placed in position to be hauled to Anaconda hill and six automatic machine guns, held in reserve in the building, were being hauled out.

Just as the men were about to be ordered to march onto the scene of trouble, Major Donohue received word that the supposed dynamiters were harmless miners on their way to work. The soldiers were thereupon sent back to bed and in a few minutes quiet again prevailed.

The work of the guard under the direction of Major Donohue, was one of the greatest displays of military tactics ever seen in Montana, and it demonstrated that the state troopers can be mastered into action as quickly as the regulars.

Snell Sounds Alarm

Captain J. J. Snell of Company H of Kallispell was the officer of the day when a telephone message was received from the Mountain View mine that a body of men were seen nearby and that they were believed to be marching onto the mine. Captain Snell at once sounded the alarm. While the men were getting up from their beds, the searchlights on the courthouse and the five searchlights on Anaconda hill were trained in the direction of the alleged dynamiters. Major Donohue jumped to a telephone and soon was in communication with mines in the neighborhood. It soon developed that the alarm was a false one and that the suspects were miners on their way to work.

To Federal Court.

The right of Governor Stewart to place Butte under martial law will be tested out in the federal court. Upon application of three of the men jailed by the military, Federal Judge Bourquin today issued an order directing the governor and the military authorities to appear in his court next Monday morning to show cause why writs of habeas corpus should not issue freeing the imprisoned men. The order was issued upon petition of James Chapman, alleged chairman of the union's deportation committee; Ed Evans, who was arrested yesterday while taking food to "Muckie" McDonald, and D. W. Malone. In their petitions, the men allege that they are illegally held by the military, that they have been arrested without warrants and have been refused bail. They further deny that a state of insurrection exists here and recite that the writ of habeas corpus has not been suspended.

No More Search.

The score of troopers who have spent the past 36 hours in searching for President "Muckie" McDonald and Vice President Bradley of the Mine Workers' union have been withdrawn. With Lieutenant Travis, who was in charge, the men returned to Butte in their autos this morning. Lieutenant Travis, reported to Major Donohue

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MAP SHOWS ADVANCE OF RUSSIA'S ARMIES



This map shows the line of advance of the czar's huge armies. In northwest Prussia a Russian force, advancing through Eydtkuhnen, Gumbinnen and Insterburg, is now threatening the fortified city of Koenigsberg, which is on the way to Berlin. Other forces, crossing the border near Johannesburg, menace the great fortified camp of Allenstein and the city of Osterode, whither the Germans are retreating. A still larger force is advancing through Russian Poland against Thorn and Posen. A huge Russian army on its way to Vienna is about to capture Lemberg, the capital of Galicia, in Austria.

WHY THE BRITISH HAVE OCCUPIED OSTEND



According to recent dispatches from London, the British have occupied Ostend, Belgium, in such large force that the Germans will be unable to capture the city. The map explains this action on the part of the British.

It is only 66 miles across the English channel from Ostend to England. While the British have made Ostend a favorite disembarking place, the Germans have been anxious to gain control of the city in order to make it a base from which bomb-throwing airmen could raid London.
