## BOOTLEGGER ASKS HE GAVE A RECEIPT FOR BULLET IN HIS LEG

MAN IN FEDERAL PRISON SENTENCED HERE, WANTS PETITION TO PRESIDENT

Notwithstanding the fact that he twice pleaded guilty to the same offense—introducing liquor onto the Flathead reservation—Clarence Black, now in the federal prison at Leavenworth, Kan., has sent to Missoula an application for executive clemency and in a letter he asks Deputy County Attorney Marlowe to circulate the petition for signatures and forward it to the president for his consideration. Black's first punishment was 90 days in the county jail here. For the second offense he was sentenced last February to serve a year and one month in the federal prison and to pay a fine of \$200. In his petition, Black alleges that he spent some time in the county jail here before his trial because the bond he offered, and which he considered a perfectly good bond, was rejected. He says he is a lumberjack and wants to gain his liberty in December so he can hike to the woods and get a winter's job. Mr. Marlowe said yesterday that he had no disposition to take up Black's case, and would return the papers to him.

## OLD PAPER UNCOVERED AT COURTHOUSE SHOWS PECULIAR TRANSACTION

"When a man is forced to give a receipt for a bullet, picked from his own flesh, to a court stenographer, this is no longer a free country," said Jack Helfrich yesterday. Jack is serving as deputy clerk of the court just at present and his natural inquisitiveness led him to explore some of the unused shelves and cases in the filing room of the office yesterday. He had just been digging around in one of these when he stopped to make the above remark.

In his hand he held a faded piece of paper. The other deputies stopped their work while he read the message it carried. This is what had inspired Jack's remark:

**The Receipt.**  
"Missoula, February 8, 1911.  
"Received of C. W. Blair exhibit 'A,' State vs. Robinson, bullet found embedded in Clarence Herring.  
"C. W. HERRING."

The receipt for the bullet received recalls the shooting of City Herder Herring by Robinson. After the trial Herring, evidently, wanted to keep the bullet that nearly cost him his life. As it had been made a part of the court records in the case, it was necessary for him to give a receipt for it in the usual form.

Put three pounds of veal, cut from the neck or shin, through the meat-chopper with half a pound of salt pork; mix with a cup of soft bread crumbs, two beaten eggs, three level teaspoonsful of salt, and a half teaspoonful of pepper, and press in a bread-tin; bake three hours; baste frequently with mixed hot water and melted butter.

## THE RAVALLI DISPLAY AT STATE FAIR TO BE FINE ONE

LARGEST AND BEST EVER SENT FROM COUNTY HAS GONE TO HELENA

Hamilton, Sept. 17.—(Special.)—Ravalli county will be represented at the state fair this fall by the largest and best exhibit ever sent there from the county. This is the statement made today by J. B. Taylor and E. A. Johnson, who will be two of the largest exhibitors from the county. An unusually fine lot of Ravalli county fruit will be the feature of the display.

The county exhibits left this afternoon for Helena, a car being well filled with the fruit and other products comprising the display. The principal exhibitors will be E. A. Johnson, J. B. Taylor, Ben Kress and H. A. Briggs. E. A. Johnson's exhibit will consist of 39 standard boxes of apples and 51 one-tier boxes. He will also show grain and other farm products. Mrs. Ben Kress will have a fine display of apples and other fruit at the fair. A large exhibit of apples, other fruits and garden and farm products were sent to the fair today by J. B. Taylor, H. A. Briggs, who has charge of the Butte Orchards this year, will display 54 boxes of apples at the fair.

Owners of these displays will go to Helena tomorrow to arrange the exhibits, splendid exhibiting space having been secured for Ravalli county.

## ESTEEMED MATRON IS DEAD, AGED 53

Hamilton, Sept. 17.—(Special.)—Mrs. Nellie May Nicol, wife of Robert W. Nicol, died at 11 o'clock last night at her home in the Hart addition. She had been in very poor health for some time. The funeral will be held Saturday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from the Presbyterian church, Rev. J. C. Irwin conducting the services. Interment will be made in Riverview cemetery.

The deceased was born in Kansas, October 31, 1860, and was a little over 53 years of age. She had been a resident of the valley for many years and was esteemed by all who knew her. Besides her husband, she is survived by four children, Mrs. H. W. Johnson of Butte and Robert H. Nicol, Harold W. Nicol and Emma A. Nicol, all of this city; a brother, B. M. Goff, of Corvallis; three sisters, Mrs. J. T. Farris, of Libby and Mrs. Thomas Thorning and Mrs. George Robbins of Darby. Her father, Jacob Goff, of Darby, also survives her.

## GRIND OUT CHICKS IN GREAT STYLE HEREAFTER

CO-OPERATIVES HATCHERY THE LATEST—BIG INCUBATOR HAS BEEN ORDERED

Stevensville, Sept. 17.—(Special.)—Stevensville is to have a new co-operative organization to be known as the Stevensville Co-operative hatchery, which will carry on a business of hatching chickens. The officers of the organization are H. B. DeForest, president; Dennis Sullivan, vice-president; and Harry Burk, secretary-treasurer.

There will be 40 shares of stock, most of which has already been subscribed at \$25 a share, each member holding a single share. The site has been selected on the Dr. Karl H. Kellogg ranch, on the west side, and cement is already on the ground for the construction of a cellar, where the 6,000-egg incubator is to be operated. The cellar will be eight feet high and 12x52 feet in ground space.

The big incubator, which has already been decided upon, will arrive here this fall and will be started up on February 1.

## SERVICE AT OVANDO FOR MRS. LEONA LYNN

The body of Mrs. Leona Lynn, who died at St. Patrick's hospital Wednesday evening from the shock of an operation, will be taken this morning to Ovando for interment.
