## PART OF THE BLAME JURY LAYS ON THE ENGINE CREW

CORONER'S INQUEST HELD TO EXAMINE CIRCUMSTANCES OF FRYE'S DEATH

Coroner Marsh conducted an inquest over the remains of Frank Frye, the man killed by a train at Arlee on Thursday morning. After listening to the testimony of several witnesses, including Conductor Thomas Chester, Engineer S. E. Merrill, brakeman L. A. Edwards, E. G. Hammer, fireman John Campos and C. J. Lumby, the jury returned its verdict as follows: That the said Frank Frye came to his death by being struck by engine 1319 at Arlee. We don't believe the proper precautions were used by engine crew and that deceased was careless and not watching out for himself."

The jurors were J. E. Smith, F. Smith, N. Coulombe, G. T. Meade, J. H. Nottingham and Joseph Deschamps.

## EMPRESS TODAY






