**Empress.**

### DE BERGE IS SUED FOR HEAVY DAMAGES

Ed Earndrup yesterday afternoon filed in the district court suit for damages against Henry De Berge. Earndrup alleges that De Berge swore out a warrant against him and had him arrested on a charge of horse-stealing. At the time the complaint was made, Earndrup declares, De Berge knew that the charge was untrue. Later De Berge refused to appear in court. Earndrup asks \$2,500 for the damages done his reputation and \$25 in payment of the expenses of a trip from Oxnard to Missoula, taken in order that the charge of horse stealing might be faced.

### UNCLE SAM SHOULD ACQUIRE MONTICELLO

Washington, Oct. 5.—Monticello, the home of Thomas Jefferson, should be maintained in the Virginia home of the presidents," in the opinion of the owner, Rep. Levy of New York, who notified Secretary Bryan today that he would consider an offer of \$500,000 for the purchase of the estate by the government. His communication will be referred to congress.

### BUTTE COURT OPENS THE MILITARY STILL RULE

EDITOR SMITH GOES FREE BUT MUST SUBMIT PAPER TO CENSOR

Butte, Oct. 5.—(Special.)—Major John P. Riddell has resigned as a member of the military commission and Captain Walter L. Verge of company M of Chateau has been appointed in his place. This announcement was made today, after a formal order was issued by Major Donohue, in command of the soldiers, restoring the military courts. It was given out by the military that Major Riddell did not resign because of any friction, but because he was needed at his home in Helena to resume his practice of physician.

**Session Is Held.**  
As soon as the order restoring the military courts was made Judge Advocate Roote held a session of his summary court, at which he handled a number of minor offenders. The first setting of cases for the military commission is Wednesday afternoon.

**Decision Expected.**  
After spending the greater part of the day in hearing arguments of attorneys, Judge Ayers took the oyster case against Sheriff Driscoll under advisement. A decision in this case, as well as that against Mayor Duncan, is expected either late this afternoon or tomorrow. Attorneys for the two officials declare that they will apply to the supreme court for writs of supervisory control, should Judge Ayers enter an order of ouster. If the order is entered, there is no stay of execution, under the law, the ouster becoming effective at once.

**The Smith Incident.**  
Butte, Oct. 5.—Clarence Smith, editor of the Butte Socialist, yesterday called on Major Dan D. Donohue for the purpose of making an explanation of his alleged violation of martial law in printing an extra edition without submitting it for the approval of the military censor. The extra edition sought to cause the inference that the state supreme court had decided there was no legal status for the Montana national guard, when as a matter of fact no such decision at all had been given. No attempt was made to arrest him, but he was informed that the patience of the military authorities had been exhausted and that drastic action would be taken in his case unless he complied in the future with the military regulations. He was told that he might continue to publish the socialist paper on condition that he first submit proofs of all articles concerning the local situation to the censor.

**The Conditions.**  
Later in the day Smith called Major Donohue on the telephone and asked permission to finish the printing of the regular edition of the Butte Socialist. He was granted this permission, but was told that the first page articles of the extra edition must not appear in print. Smith then asked that he be allowed to run the first page blank, but he was told that he could not do this. He then said that unless he could print the paper as he saw fit, he would not print it at all, and orders were issued to the sheriff's office that a deputy sheriff be sent to the shop to see that the place be kept closed until Smith agreed to comply with the orders of the military authorities.

**His Explanation.**  
Smith explained that the supposed information was received on short notice while the regular edition of the Socialist was being printed. He said the already prepared front page of the regular edition was set aside and reports from Helena and those concerning the military were substituted for an extra edition.

Major Donohue said that there was no wish to interfere with the regular edition of the Socialist and that Smith had permission to continue the publication of it, but that permission would not be given for the circulation of absolutely untrue, unfounded and perniciously inflammatory articles. He said that the same regulations applied to all newspapers published in Butte, but that the socialist paper would not be given liberties not enjoyed by other newspapers.

### EMPIRICAL CRIME IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS

THERE IS WHERE THE JUVENILE SHOULD BE REFORMED, DECLARES EXPERT

St. Paul, Oct. 5.—That the public school system of the country should be used to prevent crime was the opinion expressed by speakers before the American Prison association, in convention today. It met with hearty response from the delegates.

"It is a statistical fact that 90 per cent of the juvenile offenders began delinquency in the schools," declared D. C. Peyton, superintendent of the Jeffersonville, Ind., reformatory. "The schools should mold the characters of our children and be responsible for their futures."

### FREE TEXT BOOKS IN THE HIGH SCHOOL

NORTH SIDE ORGANIZATION IS TO INVESTIGATE MATTER—MEETING HELD

An effort will be made by the North Side Progressive league to have free text books placed at the disposal of the students of the Missoula county high school. This was decided upon last evening at a meeting of the league, held in the Whittier school building. The matter of free text books for high school students will be investigated within the next week and some definite action will probably be taken at the meeting of the league on October 19.

The session of the north side last evening was a quiet one. Because of inclement weather the attendance was small and but one candidate for office appeared to address the league. This was Carl Cameron, candidate for the state legislature on the progressive ticket. He set forth his principles and his talk was well received by the league.

The absence of many chairman of league committees made action impossible on many pending matters, as the committees have the matters in charge. The workmen's compensation measure was discussed, but nothing was done on the matter. A letter from Miles Romney, president of the People's Power league was read before the meeting. Mr. Romney asked the privilege of addressing the league on the workmen's compensation measure and other initiative bills framed by the People's Power league. Mr. Romney was granted the privilege asked and will probably speak before the North Side league on October 19.
