Why Pay \$3000 for a Smile?

TO THE VOTERS OF MISSOULA COUNTY.—

On October 18th I published the following statement in the local papers: Report of Receipts and Disbursements, Clerk and Recorder, Missoula County, Montana.

Table with 3 columns: Year, Receipts, Salaries Only. Rows for years 1906 to 1914.

A careful analysis of these figures will show that there has been an enormously disproportionate advance in the last few years in the expenses of conducting this office, as compared with the increase in the amount of work done as shown by the fees collected for recording of instruments, such as deeds, mortgages, etc.

For instance, take the years 1907 and 1913. It shows an increase of fees in the year 1913, over 1907, of less than 4 per cent, and an increase in salaries of a fraction of over 110 per cent. It also shows that up to the last three years the fees collected in this office more than paid the salaries necessary to maintain the office.

The fees reached the maximum in 1909, the expenses for salaries in that year being about 75 per cent of the fees collected, as against over 134 per cent in the year 1913. Since 1909 the fees have shown a steady decrease, except a small raise in 1910, and the salaries have been steadily increasing.

I do not believe such an increase in expense is necessary to perform the amount of work done, and I pledge the taxpayers of this county, if elected, there shall be no more help employed than is necessary for an efficient and economical administration of the affairs of the office.

One week later I made the definite statement, that if elected Clerk and Recorder, I would guarantee to save the taxpayers of Missoula County the specified sum of at least \$3,000.00 per annum in the single item of salaries alone in the conduct of the affairs of this office. I rather expected an attempt would be made to explain this enormous increase in salaries as compared with the fees collected.

In Sunday morning's Missoulian I noticed the ELEVENTH-HOUR EXPLANATION has been published, when it is too late to get a reply to all parts of the county, and the new primary law is made the goat. I cannot see why the work under the new primary law in 1914 should have any effect on the salaries paid in 1913. I did not make any comparison for the year 1914 in my statement, but confined them to the years 1907 to 1913 inclusive. The reason for this was that they were both off years, no elections being held in either of these years, and for the further reason that 1913 was the only year wherein complete annual figures were available covering the administration of the present incumbent of that office. I rather expected this ELEVENTH-HOUR EXPLANATION and anticipated it to some extent in my addresses to the voters in different parts of the county.

Another matter that the average voter has probably not taken into consideration is the fact that in 1907 there was no Auditor in this County, and the work of that office was performed by the County Clerk. I believe the removal of this work from the County Clerk, and the improved facilities for performing the work by reason of the new courthouse, for which there are \$175,000 in bonds outstanding upon which you are taxed to pay the interest, should offset the extra work occasioned by the primary law.

The Democratic County Central Committee also makes the statement that a saving of \$1,400.00 has been effected in the office of the County Clerk in the year 1914 over the year 1912. Let's see whether or not this is true.

The salaries for 1912 were \$11,570.81; therefore, the maximum saving they can possibly make will be \$218.15, allowing the present quarter to be no greater than the smallest of the other three quarters. The salary of the County Clerk is \$229.15, his chief deputy is paid \$150.00 and three other deputies \$125.00 each per month, if you will figure this up you will find that I have only added the minimum for the last quarter. I think it will be much more than this.

The official figures for 1914 were not available, but I have taken them from the published quarterly reports and they show a salary list for the three-quarters of this year in the County Clerk's office, of \$9,659.25.

The smallest quarter of these three was \$2,262.43, estimating the last quarter of the year to be the same (and I think this will be absolutely fair) it will run the salaries for the fiscal year 1914, up to \$11,352.46.

Either the published quarterly statements of the County Clerk and Recorder are wrong or the Democratic County Central Committee have mis-stated the figures. Take whichever horn of this dilemma you wish.

I concede that the present County Clerk is a very pleasant gentleman, and that he possesses all the personal qualities claimed by the Democratic Committee, but I hold that his smile is too costly a luxury.

Reiterating my pledge of a saving, I promise you just as pleasant a smile and just as courteous treatment for \$3,000.00 per annum less than it is now costing you.

PROPOSED BRIDGE OF ONLY LOCAL VALUE

PEOPLE, IF WISE, WILL DEFEAT FORTY THOUSAND DOLLAR BOND ISSUE

Editor Missoulian:—There will be presented to voters of Missoula county tomorrow a matter of important local interest so far as the taxpayers and travelers generally who make use of the public highways in this county are concerned.

The writer was much pleased to notice that on several occasions editorial comment has been made unfavorable to the authorization of a bond issue in the sum of forty thousand dollars (\$40,000) to build three bridges across the Missoula river in the vicinity of the city of Missoula. The proposed location of these bridges is one connecting the north and south banks of the Missoula river at a point between Grass Valley and the section known as the Big Flat, west of Fort Missoula; the other two to be located across the main river between Missoula and Bonner. The demand for these structures seems, with deference to the west bridge, to be entirely local and for the accommodation of citizens so few in number that it seems an unwise policy to burden all the taxpayers of the county with principal and interest charges to meet this unimportant condition. The two bridges to the east of Missoula have no important justification other than the elimination of a difficult and rather dangerous piece of road over what is known as Marshall grade. People who have lived in Missoula county for a period of years will remember that the road used by travelers between Missoula and Bonner for a great many years followed the route now proposed, and the unsatisfactory and dangerous condition of the road and bridges, irrespective of the toll feature then in vogue, will be remembered by all who had occasion to use this route at that time.

The proposed road would necessitate two additional dangerous railroad crossings, which would be entirely unjustified by the slight saving in distance by following the road on the north bank of the river. Except this slightly longer route, every element of danger and difficulty attaching to the present Marshall grade could be eliminated at an expense of \$7,000 or \$8,000 by the construction of a road around the foot of Marshall grade to the north and east of the present railroad grade built by the Northern Pacific Railway company and now used by the street car company. This expenditure might be made by the county commissioners without the necessity of issuing bonds for the purpose, as the amount required would be well within the limit of expenditures left to the discretion of the board.

This proposal would have the additional advantage of accommodating all of the residents between Bonner and Missoula, would eliminate all grade crossings between Missoula and Bonner, and would cut out the steep and difficult Marshall grade. The proposed new road having two combination bridges, requiring continual expense for maintenance and repair, would have the effect of incommuting the persons living at and near Marshall grade and in the event that the present roadway would revert to the original owners, would require some of them to make long and inconvenient detours to enter the main highway. Experience would also seem to indicate that the construction of these temporary bridges is extremely wasteful, and if any bridges on the road east of Missoula, being the main highway of the county and one of the most frequently used highways in the state, are to be constructed...


