Washington, Nov. 5.—Senatorial contests are still in doubt tonight in Colorado, Nevada and Wisconsin. Democrats claim the election of Charles S. Thomas over Hubert Work in Colorado, and Francis G. Newlands over Samuel Platt in Nevada. Republican leaders claimed the election of Francis E. McGovern over Paul A. Huston, democrat, in Wisconsin.

REGULATIONS UPON SALES OF MEAT STRICTER

STATE BOARD OF HEALTH HAS PUT STRINGENT LAWS IN EFFECT

Helena, Nov. 5.—(Special)—More stringent regulations relating to the sale of poultry and meat in Montana have been put into effect by the state board of health. The board has also made more stringent the quarantine regulations for scarlet fever and has made less severe the regulations governing measles.

The regulation governing the sale of meat now reads: "When the state board of health has satisfactory evidence that any person, persons, firm or corporation have sold, or have in their possession with the intent to sell, any carcass or part of the carcass of any animal or fowl which has died from any cause other than being slaughtered in a sanitary manner, or the carcass or part of the carcass of any animal that shows evidence of any disease, or that came from a sick or diseased animal, or the carcass or part of the carcass of any calf that was killed before it had attained the age of four (4) weeks, the said person, persons, firm or corporation shall have their license revoked by the state board of health."

MONEY'S AT HAND NO AUTHORITY TO PAY

SOME OF SHORTAGE IN OFFICE OF LIVESTOCK COMMISSION RECOVERED BY SUIT

Helena, Nov. 5.—(Special)—Funds belonging to the owners of stray livestock who suffered as a result of the shortages in the office of the secretary of the state board of stock commissioners will not be distributed until some report is made by the special livestock investigating committee of the Eleventh legislative assembly, or its attorney, George E. Hurd, of Great Falls.

There is on deposit with State Treasurer W. C. Rae \$2,500 in cash that was recovered, and in addition, \$6,000 more will be realized from the sale of a house that was turned over to the board to help make up the losses. According to the report of the livestock investigating committee, as far as could be ascertained, about \$19,000 was embezzled. With only \$5,800 available with which to cover the shortage, the livestock men will receive not quite 50 per cent on the dollar.

"I have nothing to do with the paying out of the money on hand, or at least, not until I am officially advised to whom it should be paid," said D. Raymond, secretary of the board of stock commissioners, when asked in reference to the matter. "The investigating committee made a report as to the losses but has never advised the livestock board as to who suffered these losses, and the names of the persons who should be reimbursed with whatever funds are available. Whenever we are advised in the matter, we will be glad to pay this money to its rightful owners."

COSSACK BATTALION DESTROYED BY TURKS

Berlin, via The Hague and London, Nov. 5.—The Constantinople correspondent of the Frankfurter has sent the following dispatch to his paper: "The Turks attacked and destroyed a Cossack battalion on the Russo-Turkish frontier near Ordulu and then crossed the frontier taking up a strong position in Russian territory."

SIX DIE IN FIRE.

New York, Nov. 5.—Six men were burned to death today in a fire which swept through a four-story lodging house in Eighth avenue. Fifty men were sleeping in the building; 44 had to be carried out by firemen.

SHERMAN ELECTED SENATORIAL FIGHT ON COMPLETE RETURNS

SPEECH BRYAN MADE COST MR. SULLIVAN MANY VOTES IN STATE OF ILLINOIS

Chicago, Nov. 5.—Lawrence Y. Sherman, republican, was re-elected to the United States senate, defeating Roger C. Sullivan, his democratic opponent, by 17,050 votes, according to complete returns tonight.

Robins, the progressive candidate, polled a little more than 50 per cent of the vote gathered by Colonel Roosevelt in 1912, although Roosevelt toured the state urging his election, and he had the support of most of the Chicago newspapers. It was conceded tonight that the republicans had won most of the state offices.

Pronounced opposition to Sullivan by Secretary Bryan was believed to have cost him many votes in the state, in spite of the support of Postmaster General Burleson.
