ORTEGA ESCAPES FROM A WARSHIP

(Correspondence of Associated Press.) London, Oct. 24.—The Pacific liner Ortega which arrived in Liverpool October 20 from Valparaiso was fired on by a German cruiser, probably the Leipzig, on September 19.

They found themselves in an uncharted lagoon, which was really a roundabout entrance to the Straits of Magellan. It was decided to navigate this unknown waterway and a small boat was sent ahead to take soundings.

ENGLAND'S KIND TO INDIAN MEN

(Associated Press Correspondence.) London, Oct. 24.—Earl Roberts is raising a fund which will be devoted exclusively to the use of the Indian forces in the present war.

The fund will also be used to provide warm clothing especially suited to the Indian troops. Rations of the English army are wholly unlike the customary diet of the Indians, and special dishes will be provided for them out of the fund.

Princess Mary and her advisers are making special preparations to send the Indians Christmas gifts which will especially appeal to them. It is likely the gifts will take the form of boxes of candies and other sweetmeats particularly relished by the men from the far east.

UNDERTAKING ON APPEAL

In the case of Margaret Johnson against the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railway company, an undertaking on appeal was filed in the district court by the defendant company yesterday.

In June, after the case was tried, the plaintiff secured judgment for \$35 and costs. The defendant's motion for a new trial was denied on October 17, last. Following these steps in the case came the undertaking on appeal today.

R. S. Thomson secured a judgment of \$989.88 in department No. 1 of the district court yesterday in his case against the Dixon & Sloan Transportation company. Costs of the suit were awarded in addition to the above amount.
