CATHOLIC PRELATE FIGHTS PROHIBITION

Tucson, Ariz., Dec. 4.—Bishop Henry Granjon, head of the Catholic diocese of Arizona and New Mexico, has engaged Eugene S. Ives and John B. Wright, attorneys, to contest the validity of the state prohibition law adopted at the election November 3. The contest, it was stated today, will be instituted in the name of Rev. Thomas Connelly, pastor of All Saints church of this city, and will be based on the contention that the prohibition measure is unconstitutional because its sweeping provisions would prevent the use of wine in the sacramental ceremony of the mass and thereby contravene the fundamental rights of religious organizations.

BABY IS THE VICTIM OF "BLACK" SMALLPOX

Baby Moore, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Moore of 216 Rose avenue, died yesterday afternoon of "black" smallpox, the first case of the virulent type of the disease that has made its appearance in Missoula for years. The child was 1 year and 28 days old. The funeral will be held this morning.

EIGHT HUNDRED APiece FOR THREE PLAINTIFFS

The case of Clara B. Anderson and others against the Missoula Street Railway company came to a close at 8 o'clock last evening when the jury returned its verdict. There were three separate plaintiffs in the action, three cases having been combined for the simplification of the trial, each one seeking damages for injuries received in an accident in which it was alleged that the street railway company had been to blame. The plaintiffs were Clara B. Anderson, by her guardian, John G. Anderson; Carrie Bell Anderson and Grace Bislar. The jury awarded each plaintiff the sum of \$800.

RIBERDY BRINGS SUIT TO COLLECT INSURANCE

Ed F. Riburdy of St. Regis commenced suit in the district court yesterday against the Home Insurance company of New York, in an effort to collect \$2,500 on a fire loss. The complaint alleges that a policy was issued by the Missoula agents of the defendant company on Riburdy's lumber yards at St. Regis, on which he offered to pay the premium agreed upon, \$50. After the policy was in full force and effect his lumber burned and his loss was \$2,000. The insurance company, it is alleged, now denies all responsibility in the matter of reimbursing the policy holder.
