POULTRY SHOW CLOSES

Charles Preece Wins Sweepstakes at Hamilton Chicken Exposition.

Hamilton, Jan. 27.—(Special.)—After a three-day session which was extremely successful as an exposition, at least, Ravalli county's big poultry show was closed tonight. The judges are working tonight on the awards, and tomorrow a full announcement will be made through The Missoulian.

Winners of the big prizes were announced today. Charles Preece, with his splendid flock of Buff Orpingtons, won the sweepstakes, and W. J. Fullerton of Hamilton took capital honors in the White Leghorn class, where competition was especially keen. It is expected, though official confirmation is lacking, that the prize for the best general display will go to Frank Hogan of Hamilton.

The quality of the birds exhibited at the show was unusually good, and Ravalli county poultry fanciers are proud of the showing they were able to make. Most of the exhibitors were from the Bitter Root valley, but many outside fanciers, among them some Kalispell breeders and Kane and York of Butte, had pens at the show.

Helena, Jan. 27.—The jury in the trial in the federal district court here of officers, directors and stock salesmen of the Northwestern Trust company on a charge of using the mails to defraud, this morning brought in a verdict convicting J. G. W. Wilcox and R. R. Sidebotham, while acquitting all other defendants not heretofore dismissed by the court.

Among those acquitted today were A. M. Alderson, former secretary of state; W. C. Rae, former state treasurer; J. W. Speer, former mayor of Great Falls; D. G. Bertoglio, wealthy business man of Meadville, a suburb of Butte; and Miss M. A. Cort of Great Falls, an employe of the company. Judge Bourquin announced that he will sentence the convicted defendants Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock.
