COMMISSIONER'S TRAIN KILLS MAN.

Desatur, Ill., May 7.—The first unfortunate incident to mar the pleasure of the greatest trip of the French commissioners occurred late this afternoon, when the train on which the party is traveling ran down and killed Peter Quick, aged 47. Quick had been a spectator to the brief reception tendered the commissioners and his death came just as the train had started from the depot.

State Flash

Date Is Set—A Washington dispatch to the Independent says Congresswoman Rankin today set May 24 as the date for competitive examination for appointment from Montana to the naval academy.

Executive Committee Named—The state highway commission met here today and named as an executive committee of three to take active charge of work in the state, Oscar Rohm of Butte, chairman; Hugh R. Wells, Miles City, and Archie Mahon, Glasgow. Inspectors will be named later.

Man Identified—The man found in Ten Mile creek yesterday was identified today as John Conlon, a former Butte Policeman. He was drowned, but how he met his death is not known.

Predicts High Water—W. A. Lamb, district engineer of the federal geological survey predicts swollen streams in Montana this year. He thinks some rivers may reach the highest marks in decades. Snows in the hills are unusually heavy and melting slowly now and sudden spell of warm weather would bring dangerous freshets.

Home Rule Resolution—The lower house of the Pennsylvania legislature tonight adopted a resolution directing the secretary of the commonwealth to urge Arthur J. Balfour to use his influence with the British government to secure home rule for Ireland.

Enlists as Seaman—A Washington special to the Journal says: Donald R. McCumber, son of Senator P. J. McCumber of North Dakota, has enlisted as a second-class seaman in the naval reserve and leaves Washington tonight for the Norfolk training station.

Given German Names—Two interned German commerce raiders that were taken over by the United States government will bear the names of Germans who fought with the Continental army in the American war for liberty. Secretary Daniels announced today that the Kronprinz Wilhelm will be renamed the Baron von Steuben, and the Prinz Eitel Friedrich, the Baron de Kalb. Both vessels will be placed in service under the American flag as soon as repairs are completed.

Five Nations Represented—Great Britain, France, Italy, Russia and the United States had representatives at the war council of nations. American plans believed to be well advanced. Numerous developments are likely to follow.

District Extended—The jurisdiction of the immigration district of Washington has been extended to include all Canadian border stations as far east as the eastern line of Montana by an order of the department of labor received today by Henry M. White, immigration commissioner.

Menocal Re-Elected—The Cuban congress in joint session today proclaimed General Mario G. Menocal re-elected president for another four-year term, with General Emilio Nunez as vice president.

Will Not Call Meeting—There will be no meeting of the American association at the present time to consider a policy of retrenchment, according to George Tebeau, owner of the Kansas City team of the association. In a statement tonight Mr. Tebeau asserted that the Kansas City, Indianapolis, Toledo, Louisville and Columbus owners were opposed to a meeting for such a purpose.

TO PLACE SITUATION BEFORE PLAYERS

Postponements Cost American Association \$10,000.

Chicago, May 7.—Although declining to admit that players in the American association would be asked to accept a reduction in salaries President Hicket after a conference here today with half a dozen club managers, said the situation confronting the club owners would be placed before the players and others alike. President Hicket denied that a part of the schedule would be cancelled. The subject he said had not been contemplated, although the league had lost \$10,000 because of postponements within the last 10 days.

"Every club owner wants to go through the season," he said. "But if the government imposes a tax on baseball and the war situation cuts down the attendance, it will be absolutely necessary for us to retrench. The opening this season was the most disastrous in the history of the association."

Hickey left for Milwaukee tonight for a conference there tomorrow with owners of the Milwaukee and Columbus clubs. He will visit Kansas City Wednesday and will call a special meeting later in the week if the club owners request it.

MACHINISTS THREATEN STRIKE.

Winnipeg, Man., May 7.—Nine hundred machinists employed in the shops at Transcona, Man., have served notice that they will strike tomorrow morning unless the demands for increased wages of 50 tool makers and repair men, who went on strike Thursday are granted.
