




### MISSOULA HAS CHANCE TO SEND AMBULANCES

Small Donation Will Complete Fund Necessary to Equip Two Motors.

#### LOCAL BOYS WIRE

City Can Render Big Help by \$500 Contribution to Worthy Cause.

By raising \$500 quickly Missoula people may send to the French front two Missoula boys and two motor ambulances. The boys are David Roberts and Bryan Wilburn, graduates of the Missoula high school and now students in Beloit college.

David Roberts is the son of Frank A. Roberts of this city. Yesterday he sent the following telegram to his father:

"If Missoula Chamber of Commerce can raise \$500 Wilburn and I can sail June 2, or shortly after the Beloit contingent of seven men goes."

Chicago people recently contributed money enough to equip seven ambulances for the American Ambulance Field service in France and are sending seven volunteers from Beloit college to the front with the cars. The two Missoula boys wanted to accompany this contingent, but volunteered too late. Apparently, however, there was in the Chicago fund a surplus which lacks only \$500 of being enough to equip and transport two more ambulances. The Missoula boys will be sent across the Atlantic with these two cars if Missoula people raise the needed money.

It is pointed out that to equip a car ordinarily costs \$1,600. Missoula may send two cars, manned by Missoula men, for \$500. The rest of the necessary \$3,200 will be furnished by Chicago donors.

The American Ambulance Field service in France has been this country's most notable contribution to the cause of the nations which are now its allies. Of it an officer on General Joffre's staff has said:

"The American Ambulance Field service is the finest flower of the magnificent wreath offered by the great America to her little Latin sister. Those who like you and your friends have consecrated themselves entirely to our cause, up to and including the supreme sacrifice, deserve more than our gratitude. We cannot think of them in the future as other than our own."

The service has had sections of American volunteers on the Yser, on the Aisne, on the Somme, in Champagne, in the Argonne, at Verdun, in the Weverre, in Lorraine and in reconquered Alsace, and it has two sections with the French army of the Orient in the Balkans. There are at present 73 citations from the French army.

The two boys who would represent Missoula in this volunteer service are well known here. Bryan Wilburn is the son of Mrs. E. F. Wilburn, 822 Sherwood street. Like young Roberts he distinguished himself in the Missoula county high school. Since going to Beloit he has made an excellent record in athletics.

Contributions toward the \$500 fund will be received by F. A. Roberts, First National bank building, or D. D. Richards, secretary of the Missoula Chamber of Commerce.

### E. H. RATHBONE, EDITOR, DIES AT RONAN HOME

Prominent Montana Newspaper Man Succumbs to Bright's Disease.

#### VETERAN JOURNALIST

Dead Man Began Professional Career in Wyoming While Mere Boy.

E. H. Rathbone, publisher and editor of the Ronan Pioneer, died at his home at Ronan at 8:30 o'clock yesterday morning of Bright's disease, according to a special dispatch to The Missoulian. Mr. Rathbone is survived by a wife, a son, Justus, the present business manager of the Ronan Pioneer; a daughter, Mrs. Hazel M. Putney; a brother, Attorney Coker F. Rathbone of Ronan, and a sister, Mrs. Clarissa Bigalow of Marshalltown, Iowa. With the exception of the sister, all were present at the deathbed together with Dr. R. R. Rathbone of Dillon, a cousin of the deceased.

Mr. Rathbone was born at Steamboat Rock, Iowa, April 11, 1865. He has spent all his life since a boy in the newspaper business, receiving his first experience in northern Wyoming. Twenty-five years ago he came to Montana and at Lewistown founded and for a time published the Fergus County Republican. Later he moved to Hardin, where he published the Hardin Tribune. The Sanders County Ledger at Thompson Falls was his next venture. Seven years ago he moved to Ronan and entered into association with his brother, Coker Rathbone, in the publication of the Ronan Pioneer. Later he took over the entire management of the paper and has been running it alone for the past few years.

Mr. Rathbone was a member of the Knights of Pythias and of the Masons. The people of Ronan speak highly of him as a public-spirited man of unusual ability. He was at one time mayor of the city. He has been ill for the past year, following an attack of the grip, which brought on Bright's disease.

The services will be held at the Methodist Episcopal church at Ronan Thursday morning at 10:30 o'clock. The remains will be shipped to Spokane for cremation. Final interment will be made in Mr. Rathbone's home town, Steamboat Rock, Iowa.
