## PAUL REVERES WILL GET BIG RECEPTION

Hamilton Chamber of Commerce to Welcome Delegations From Missoula.

## PLAN BAND CONCERT

Business Men of Hamilton Discuss Many Matters of Importance to City.

Hamilton, May 9.—(Special).—The regular monthly meeting of the executive committee of the Hamilton Chamber of Commerce was held Tuesday evening and resulted in the discussion of many important points and action of considerable importance to the community. The first question that came before the meeting was the question of support to the Red Cross movement. The members expressed themselves as heartily in favor of this work and a motion was made and carried that the Hamilton Chamber of Commerce endorse the movement. The members then discussed the advisability of many improvements of the city and possibility of increasing the water pressure and it was finally moved that the chamber of commerce get behind the movement for a commission form of government for the city of Hamilton.

Notice was then given that the Missoula Chamber of Commerce was preparing for a parade in support of the defense movement and that on Sunday about 25 autos and a band would tour the valley. The cars would be decorated with the national colors and expected to leave Missoula at 10 o'clock, arriving at Stevensville about noon for dinner and at Hamilton at 5 o'clock, where a band concert will be held on the lawn in front of the Ravalli hotel. Mr. Richards of the chamber of commerce of Missoula, notified the chamber of commerce at Hamilton to this effect and at the meeting of Tuesday the question of the details was referred to the entertainment committee consisting of Messrs. E. T. Kaster, A. F. Hobbs and A. J. Johnston who will make plans to properly receive the Missoula people.

It was also decided that a general meeting of the membership and other residents of Hamilton and vicinity be called in the near future and that some entertainment be furnished for that evening. This was referred to the entertainment committee who will announce definite plans later. A letter to be addressed to the residents of Hamilton and vicinity was then presented. It asked the people to express any objections that they have as to Hamilton business methods and return the information unassigned to the chamber of commerce. It was voted that this letter be sent and that the information thus secured be presented to the business men.

The question of unjustifiable demands made upon the business men of Hamilton came before the meeting and after a thorough discussion it was moved that a committee be appointed to pass upon all such measures and that the business men of Hamilton be asked to consent that they would not contribute to any solicitors unless the matter had been sanctioned by the chamber of commerce.

## RONAN OPERA HOUSE IS TO BE REBUILT

Ronan, May 9.—(Special).—Contract for a \$10,000 opera house was let by H. M. Gehlert of Ronan a few days ago when in Spokane, there consulting architects in regard to its construction. It is to be built opposite Secare's store on the site of the former opera house which burned last December and of which Mr. Gehlert also was the owner. The facade will be built of choice white brick while the other sides will be of tile, making its construction fire proof throughout. Preparations for the new building were begun Tuesday by cleaning up the debris caused by the fire of the old theater. The brick and tile have already been shipped from Spokane and are expected to arrive here soon.

## BITTER ROOT VALLEY PEOPLE TO SUBSCRIBE

Get Chance at Liberty Loan Through Medium of Local Banks.

## EXPECT MANY TO BUY

Telegram Received by Stevensville Institution From McAdoo.

Stevensville, May 9.—(Special).—Stevensville people will have an opportunity of subscribing to the government war loan, through the medium of the local banks. The following telegram has been received by the local banking institutions from the secretary of the treasury: "Government will receive until June 15th, subscriptions for two billion 3/4 Liberty Loan. You can render your country invaluable service by receiving subscriptions to same and co-operating with the federal reserve bank in your district. Will you kindly estimate amount your district will subscribe for and wire me, at my expense."

Although it is not known how much will be subscribed it is certain that Stevensville people will offer money.

## JAVELIN RECORD IS BEATEN NEAR RONAN

Ronan, May 9.—(Special).—The interscholastic record of 1915, being 152 6-10 feet, made by Hawk of Missoula, was broken at the track meet of school district No. 28, including 13 schools, held at Leon school, May 5, when Archie McDonald threw the javelin a distance of 162 1/2 feet. The meet was won by Post Creek with a score of 71, followed by Ronan with 27 points, and St. Ignatius with a score of 19.

The senior declamation contest taking place in the forenoon, including only high school students, was won by John L. Conner of St. Ignatius, with Alice Sheen of Ronan, second, Dorothy Dall of Round Butte was given first place in the junior contest and Marie Buchard of Ronan, second. The junior contest was limited to graded school students, Miss June Whiting, instructor in Polson high school, acted as the judge.

Twelve events were staged on the athletic field in the afternoon. Archie McDonald won the 50 yard dash with a time of 54 4-5 seconds; the 100 yard dash with a time of 11 2-5 seconds; the 200 yard dash with a time of 27 2-5 seconds; the shot put with a distance of 39 feet, 5 1/2 inches; the discus throw with a distance of 100 feet, 6 inches; the high jump with a height of 5 feet, 5 1/2 inches; and the javelin throw with a distance of 163 feet, 1 inch. With a time of 1 minute,

4 2-5 seconds, Irving Allard won the 440 yard run and the 880 yard run with a time of 3 minutes, 31 4-5 seconds. Melvin Dix made the mile run in 5 minutes, 37 seconds and the pole vault with a height of 9 feet, 6 inches.

## INTRUDER WOUNDS N. P. TUNNEL GUARD

Livingston, May 9.—Hazen Nutting, a private of the Second Montana, engaged in a rifle duel with an intruder in a tunnel of the Northern Pacific, about midnight Wednesday, ten shots being fired, one piercing the soldier's hat, a second his trousers. Nutting then ran in a chase after the intruder who escaped to the hills, evading a platoon of soldiers which followed him. A pick axe was found near the entrance to the tunnel and it is thought that the intruder sought to plant some dynamite. Nutting, who is 19 years old and is from Laurel, was taken to Bozeman for treatment. His wound is not serious.

## NEW POSITION TAKEN BY PROFESSOR GETZ

Carl H. Getz, formerly assistant professor of journalism at the State University, has resigned his position on the faculty of Ohio State University and, at the close of the college year, will assume the duties of news editor of The Editor and Publisher, one of the leading publications of the newspaper craft in this country. Professor Getz will live in New York.

Mrs. Carl H. Getz, formerly Miss Carol O'Donnell of Billings and a student in the State University of Montana, will be a student in the Montana summer session where she will complete the work necessary to obtain her bachelor's degree. For a year Mrs. Getz has been taking work in the Ohio State University, but she desires to receive her degree from her home state and will come back to Montana for the summer.

## CENSORSHIP SECTION HOLDS UP SPY BILL


Washington, May 9.—Some of the parliamentary difficulties in the path of the administration espionage bill with its press censorship and embargo provisions were cleared away in the senate today, but efforts to obtain a unanimous consent agreement to vote finally on the measure Saturday failed. The bill will be taken up again tomorrow, with the press censorship section still occupying the center of attention. Leaders hope for a final vote by Saturday night.

## RESERVATION CROPS LOOK GOOD TO HIM

Reservation farmers are way ahead of the tillers of the soil in other parts of the state, as far as plowing and seeding is concerned, according to L. H. Brownfield, a prominent reservation rancher who stopped in Missoula yesterday on his way home. Mr. Brownfield says that while the season has been late in the Flathead country, it is far ahead of the rest of western Montana. Over 50 per cent of the ranchers on the reservation have finished seeding, he says, and he believes that the crop will be the largest ever. Mr. Brownfield owns a ranch two miles from Dixon, near the Flathead branch of the Northern Pacific railroad.
