

SOLDIERS STEAL RIDES ON FAST TRAINS HOME

Commonest Offense in Italian Army Is "Hurrying to Family."

CAN'T WAIT LONGER

Men, Unwilling to Go on Slow Schedules, Try to Evade Police.

Rome.—One of the most frequent causes of arrests of soldiers of the Italian army is not for drunken or disorderly conduct but for violation of the order that when given leave of absence to visit their homes, they shall ride on slow and not express trains.

Since the reduction recently of fast trains on the railroads, as a cost saving measure, the policemen have been stationed on each fast train to prevent soldiers, who ride free, from traveling on them.

"What are you doing here?" demanded the policeman.

"I'm going home from the hospital," answered the soldier.

"You don't look as if you had ever seen the inside of one," the other retorted.

The soldier silently threw back his cap with his left hand.

"I guess you've earned the right to ride on the expresses," said the policeman and passed on.

not bake beyond his needs. Eat less cake and pastry.

Beef, mutton or pork not more than once daily. Use freely vegetables and fish.

Save the milk. The children must have milk. Use every drop.

Save the sugar. Sugar is scarce. We use today three times as much per person as our allies.

Save the fuel. Coal comes from a distance and our railroads are overburdened hauling war material.

Use More Green Stuff. Fruits and vegetables we have in abundance.

General rules: Buy less, serve smaller portions; preach the gospel of the clean plate; don't limit the plain food of growing children; watch out for the wastes in the community; full garbage pails in America mean empty dinner pails in America and Europe.

Patronize your local producer. Distance means money. Buy perishable food from the neighborhood nearest you and thus save transportation.

Nation's Educators at Portland Emphasize Thrift.

Portland, Ore., July 7.—Open discussion by members of the National Council of Education on the general topic of "the obligations and opportunities of the schools during the war," was the crowning event tonight of the first day's preliminaries to the convention of the National Education association.

Arthur H. Chamberlain, secretary of the California council of education of San Francisco, spoke on "Agricultural Preparedness and Food Conservation." He declared that the entrance of the United States into the war means that we must feed the allied countries as well as our own and that, realizing this, the grammar and high schools are taking part in crop production and food conservation.

The first message delivered direct to the nation by President Wilson after the declaration of a state of war with Germany was on the subject of thrift, declared S. W. Strauss of New York, president of the American Society of Thrift, speaking on the subject, "Thrift, a Patriotic Necessity."

Other speakers tonight were R. H. Wilson, state superintendent of public instruction of Oklahoma; J. M. Beall, dean of the school of commerce of the Oregon Agricultural college; Henry R. Daniel, secretary of the American Society of Thrift; and C. H. Dempsey, superintendent of schools of Haverhill, Mass.

Ella Flagg Young, former superintendent of the schools of Chicago, was guest of honor this evening at a dinner given by the Oregon Civic League. Mrs. Young spoke on "Our Ideal of Universal Education."
