## SWANBERG APPEALS

Missoula Captain Requests Aid of Home People in Work.

Hugo H. Swanberg, captain of the 5th battalion of the 16th depot brigade at Camp Lewis, American Lake, has sent a letter to the chamber of commerce asking assistance in securing for the men of his battalion some of those things which will make sports possible. Mr. Swanberg was long a Missoula resident before he went into the army's service and says he now has among the 400 men under his command a number of Missoula boys.

Mr. Swanberg's letter follows in part: "We are in distress as to how we will be able to secure needed equipment and other articles for the men's entertainment. Other organizations having men from this vicinity have been getting donations from their towns, such as Tacoma's delegation, who have been able to secure even music for their band.

"If you know of any persons who are willing to send us a donation of small sums of money so we may secure this equipment or willing to send us the following: Baseballs, baseball bats, baseball gloves, and mitts, minks, boxing gloves, quirts or horseshoes, footballs, handballs, or anything that may be useful for the entertainment of the men, we would be very grateful if you would call their attention to this, as it will break off the monotony of the men's daily drills and instructions.

## JOE NOVAK'S YOUNGEST PROFESSIONAL GOLFER

New Missoula Country Club Player Learned Game as Caddy.

## NATIVE OF MONTANA

Only Northwestern Expert Who Hails From This Commonwealth.

Joe Novak, the new professional at the Missoula Country club who arrived in the city to take up his duties this week, is a self-made player of the great game. He is the only native Montana professional player. And he's the youngest professional in the whole northwest.

He was born—not so very many years ago—in Butte, and in his boyhood he was a caddy at the country club there. Finally he was taken under the wing of Bert Noble, the professional player there, who started him at polishing clubs, painting old balls white, and so on. Joe gradually learned to play the game, until finally he became so expert that he was offered and accepted the post of professional at Helena.

After some time there he returned to Butte, from where he came to Missoula. In this year's open championship tournament he finished in second place, the only player to lead him being the one who had taught him the game—Bert Noble.

## Sweden Has Professional and Conscripted Soldiers

The National Geographic society issues the following bulletin on Sweden's army and navy:

"Like practically all European countries, the military system of Sweden is based primarily on universal service, but there is also the nucleus of a professional military organization which serves as a training corps for the men who are called to the colors each year and who are liable to service for a period extending over 36 years—from 20 to 42 years of age inclusively.

"The first division in the universal service scheme is known as the first 'upbad' or category, and is for 11 years; the second is for four years, and the last (the landstorm or reserve) is for eight years. The first period of training for the infantry is 250 days; for the cavalry, field and heavy horse artillery 231 days, and for the coast artillery, garrison and engineers 295 days.

485,000 Enrolled.

"The peace strength in 1915 was given as 22,500 in the volunteer enlistment branch and 53,500 conscripts.

"The total military enrollment in Sweden is 485,000 from a total population of 5,000,000, residing in an area about equal to the combined areas of Colorado and Oklahoma.

"The army is equipped with Mauser rifles, while the artillery weapon is a 7.5 centimeter Krupp quick-firing gun.

Sweden's Armed Strength.

"Sweden's naval strength is not particularly formidable. Of its 16 principal warships, some of which date as

## Schoolboy, Blind Since 3 Years Old, May See

Vancouver, Wash.—Blind, deaf and dumb since he was 3 years old, Otto Strebe, a pupil at the Washington State School for the Deaf, has submitted to a second operation on his eye, and when he has another performed, the doctors believe he will have perfect sight in one eye. The other eye was destroyed when a dynamite cap which he threw into the fireplace exploded.

He will continue his school training when he regains his sight, but he will always be deaf. He had learned to sign about 150 words when school closed in June.

## HARD WORK MAPPED OUT FOR NEW ARMY

Program Provides 16 Weeks Intensive Training.

Washington, Oct. 5.—Training work mapped out by the war department for national guard and national army divisions before they will be regarded as ready for duty abroad will be based on a 16 week course of the most intensive kind of work in the open, varied with lectures by American and allied officers. To insure uniformity of training throughout the entire army, divisional commanders have been urged to see that the schedules announced today are followed closely.

Trench raiding, scouting, trench building and operations of all kinds which may be called for in actual combat will be duplicated at the camps through the night hours. To give the men some respite, their Wednesday and Saturday afternoons will be kept free.

A striking feature of the program is that practically the entire 16 weeks will be devoted to training individuals, platoons and companies. Since the platoon, commanded by a lieutenant, is the actual fighting unit in trench battles, the new regulations fix upon the lieutenants of each company the responsibility for training of less than company units, so that they may get in close touch with their men and to get up an understanding of each other that will be invaluable when they finally "go over the top."
