GENERAL NEWS.

Doings Throughout the World and the Nation.

Items Taken From the Latest Telegraphic Reports on Subjects of Interest.

A plot to assassinate the Sultan of Turkey was discovered last Thursday.

Three deaths and four cases of yellow fever at Key West are reported for last week.

The Canadian government is increasing the defenses and military force of British Columbia.

Trueman, the Illinois blooded live stock man, reached Helena from the east last week.

The president and party reached safely their camping ground in the Adirondacks last Friday.

The recently-elected commonwealth attorney of Norfolk county, New York, is a colored man.

The Pennsylvania railroad is going to build a tunnel under the Hudson river at New York at a cost of \$1,000,000.

Last week Al Herrick, an eight-year-old boy at Anoka, Dakota, was kicked to death by a horse in his father's stable.

Foreign bondholders of the Kansas Pacific railroad are going to sue Jay Gould, Russell Sage, and others for \$3,000,000.

Lord Colin Campbell has gone into bankruptcy. Of \$9,000 of liabilities \$5,000 are for costs of his recent divorce suit.

Ben Perley Poore, the famous journalist and writer, died last week in Washington, D. C., and his remains were taken to Boston.

Six men who went out on the river at Montreal, Canada, in a row boat, had too much whiskey aboard and all but one was drowned.

The long lookout of clothing cutters by the Philadelphia clothing exchange was ended last Friday, about 600 men resuming work.

The bark Macleod, arriving at Philadelphia last week, brings news of a terrible cholera scourge raging at Buenos Ayres, S. A.

Two cargoes of steel rails—2,800 tons, or 186 car-loads—for Northern Pacific branches, were unloaded at Superior City, Wis., a few days ago.

Mexico has subsidized a line of steamers to carry mails free of expense to the United States, between San Diego, Cal., and Lower California.

Olympia Brown Willis is to be tried for stuffing the ballot box at Racine, Wis. Mrs. Willis is the leader of the woman suffragists of Wisconsin.

Pneumo-pneumonia exists to an alarming extent among the neat cattle in Scotland and their importation has been prohibited until further notice.

At the close of a performance of the Wild West show in London last week Queen Victoria had the honor of being presented to Red Shirt and two or three papooses.

The stables of the South End Belt Line in New York were entirely destroyed by fire last Friday, with 1,600 horses and nearly all the cars in the building. Loss, \$1,325,000.

The Oregon & Transcontinental railroad has commenced suit in the U. S. circuit court to restrain the Northern Pacific from building the Spokane & Palouse railroad.

A violent shock of earthquake, accompanied by the usual oscillations and tremblings, occurred at the City of Mexico on Sunday last, causing much fright and but little damage.

At the Progressist-Liberal conference at Brussels last week a resolution against universal suffrage was adopted, but the conference pronounced in favor of the franchise to all who could read and write.

The Opera Comique, in Paris, was destroyed by fire last Wednesday, May 25th, and nearly 200 persons are missing. Most of the actors escaped, but many people in the upper galleries were crushed to death.

The trotting stallion J. W. South, owned by Nat Brown, died last Saturday, at Denver, from the effects of poison, it is supposed, given him the day before to defeat him in a race for which he was entered.

The evictions carried on at Bodicke, Ireland, last week were attended by exciting scenes. A fight occurred and the police charged on the people with batons.

The persons to be evicted are all barricaded in their homes and have plenty of friends along assisting. It is believed that severe fighting and even bloodshed is inevitable.

A large anti-saloon meeting was held at Cooper's Union, New York, last Saturday evening, which was addressed by ex-Secretary of the Treasury Windom, Judge Noah Davis, and others.

Parnell's malady is now known to be Bright's disease of the kidneys. He is weak and emaciated and his most hopeful friends now admit that his chances of recovery are doubtful.

A woman giving her name as Ida Walsh, who has just attempted suicide in Chicago, Ill., is supposed to be Theresa Sturlatta who served a year's term in the Joliet penitentiary for the killing of Charles Stiles in 1882.

The San Francisco customs officers recently seized the German bark Nautilus from Hamburg. Three thousand dollars' worth of Havana cigars and French brandy were found, the latter being in cases marked "salt pork."

A party of seven armed bandits were surprised near Tio Cano lake last week and two of their number captured. The remainder of the gang attacked the Mexican customs guard near San Miguel, where one more of them was killed.

The counting of the money in the United States treasury is being made incidental to the transfer of the office from Mr. Jordan to Mr. Hyatt. Seventy-five persons will be employed and the time occupied will be fully two months.

The governor's respite for a man named Leggett, who was sentenced to be hanged last Friday, at Reidsville, Ga., arrived just after the noose had been placed and the blockcap drawn. It was carried by one of Leggett's lawyers 45 miles on horseback.

It was reported last week but afterwards denied that requisition papers by the governor of Arkansas on the governor of California had been issued for the arrest of William Kiasena, the object being to compel him to pay his forfeited bail bond in the Martha Washington case.

A miner in Stray Horse Gulch gave himself up to the authorities at Leadville, Col., last Friday for shooting Thos. Mulholland in a quarrel. Officers were despatched to the scene of the alleged killing and found Mulholland unharmed, having tripped and fell just as Burns fire his shot.

The interior department has approved the right-of-way of the St. Paul, Minneapolis & Manitoba railroad company through that portion of the Blackfoot reservation which lies within the jurisdiction of the Fort Peck Indian agency in Montana. The distance is 179 miles, and the number of acres required is 3,578, the appraised value of which is fifty cents per acre.

Theodore Hahn, arrested in New York for stealing diamonds from society women who employed him as butler, pleaded guilty last Saturday and explained his method of operating, which consisted in taking diamonds from their settings and substituting paste. He had been a watchmaker and diamond setter, and had earned as much as \$50 per week at his trade, but had been out of work for some months.

At Rickville, Mo., last week, a man named John Vanderburg was supposed to have chloroformed and criminally assaulted young Jennie Anderson after having stopped at her home and asked her for a drink of water, which he got. At the preliminary hearing held subsequently three shots in rapid succession were heard and Vanderburg fell dead. It was afterwards discovered that Vanderburg was entirely innocent. The Anderson brothers were indicted for murder.

Livingston Enterprise: Jerry Watson, who is in charge of the old agency at attendant in district court in Billings Stillwater under Agent Williamson, was an last week. For some grievance entertained against Judge Bach, Watson made reference to his honor as a pilgrim — of a b—." The matter being brought to the attention of the court, Watson was fined \$50 and sentenced to two days in the penitentiary for contempt.

Fred Klane proposes to enter pretty extensively into dairying this season says the Husbandman. He is now milking upward of thirty cows, and will in a short time increase the number to seventy. He reads the papers and is well posted on the subject of butter-making as is evidenced by the excellent quality of butter which he places on the market. And, by the way, why should not more attention be paid throughout the territory to this matter of supplying the market with dairy products instead of having them shipped in from St. Paul and other distant places?

TERRITORIAL NEWS.

Items of Interest From Both Sides of the Divide.

Notes Clipped and Condensed From Exchanges Published Within the Territory.

Billings is shipping building stone to Helena.

Warm Spring creek, Lost creek and the Deer Lodge river are running very high.

L. A. Osborne, the cowboy poet is temporarily in charge of the Townsend Transcript.

H. E. Lawrence has sold out the Rising Sun on account of ill health and will go to California.

Mr. Rhea has invested in a quartz prospect in Butte, called the Polly and lying north of the Elm Orlu.

Counsellor Clough has resigned the attorneyship of the Northern Pacific, to take service with the Manitoba.

A contract has been let for one hundred and fifty thousand ties, to be used in building the Bitter Root Railroad.

A call has been issued for a meeting of the Judith Wool-Growers' Association to be held at Lewistown, June 4th, 1887.

The Monthly Herald is the name of a new paper just started in Helena, devoted to the interests of the Young Men's Christian Association.

The appraisers of the Montana Central right of way through north Helena fix the aggregate damage to the various property owners at \$21,098.20.

Husbandman: Housen and Andrew Cooper have sold their entire Musselshell herd of cattle to the Northwestern Cattle company, at \$28 per head, to include cattle of all ages found on the round-up.

The miners of Cooke City, the Livingston Enterprise and the Bozeman Chronicle are having a three-cornered jawing match over the antagonism of the miners towards the Rocky Forks railroad company.

L. A. Van Horne and Harris Doble have discovered an immense ledge of marble of superior quality near Gardiner, on the Yellowstone river. They are developing the find and think they have an immense thing.

Husbandman: Messrs. True & Sweet, large cattle owners of the Judith, will not commence their cattle round-up until August 1st, when the calf and beef round-up will be blended into one and will last probably until Dec. 1st.

Two fine stallions were sold in Benton within the last few days which were imported from Canada by Mr. Ed. Henry; one a bay English shire horse to Ed. Kelly for \$800, and the other, a Norman, to David Morrow for \$600.—River Press.

The branch railroad to the National Park from Livingston is to be furnished with new ties. The trains this season will run from Livingston to Cinnabar in the morning and return in the evening, making connection with the east and west bound trains.

W. A. Dewar, once the owner of Helena real estate, has been missing for several years, and his property being sold for taxes was bought by his old-time partner, Joseph Davis, for a mere song. Now his heirs are applying to the probate court to have the property redeemed.

Sun River Sun: Notwithstanding all our efforts to make the cattle losses from the hard winter appear as light as possible, it is an indisputable fact that almost every bull on the range has perished, and many more cows and young cattle than was at first supposed; and the end is not yet.

People having cattle on the ranges between O'Keefe and Frenchtown are considerably alarmed over the report that a band of sheep are to be turned loose on the hills. They propose to fight the common enemy of the cow, and to prevent by every means the introduction of sheep on their range.—Missoula Times.

Ex-Governor Potts has returned to Helena, having been examined and placed under treatment by Prevost Pepper, of the University of Pennsylvania, at Philadelphia. His ailment is a tumor of the artery running from the stomach to the throat, causing bronchial affection. It was growing and liable to result fatally.

Andrew Whitesides, whose daughter was reported as having eloped with F. C. Armitage, confirms the report of the marriage, but tells the New Northwest that there is no truth in the report that he followed the couple with a shot gun, Mr. Armitage, the groom, being a gentleman

whom he highly respects. He had simply desired a postponement of the marriage on account of the youth of his daughter, but when they concluded to marry anyhow that settled it with him.

New Northwest: The called meeting of the Deer Lodge county stock association, last Saturday, resulted in a dissolution of the organization. It was found that no material object could be accomplished as a local organization, and the proposition to join the territorial organization did not appear to meet with favor.

Miner: The Little Missouri round-up started from the head of Sand creek May 10, and will work all through the reservation to the Big Missouri. Two wagons started on the Kill Deer and will work down the Big Missouri. After all cattle are brought back, which will be about July 1st, they will work the Little Missouri tributaries.

A rancher named Jacobs in Dixie gulch owns a stock range which was taken up under the mineral act for placer mining. The Montana Union has encroached upon him to some extent, and to get even he has posted notices on the open cut east of the gulch, locating a lode or claim. He makes the remarkable claim to have panned out sixteen colors from the dirt in one of the cuts, which is chiefly decomposed granite!
