GENERAL NEWS.

Doings Throughout the World and the Nation.

Items Taken From the Latest Telegraphic Reports on Subjects of Interest.

King Milan, of Serbia, is about to sue for a divorce.
The Sunday closing agitation has struck St. Louis, Mo.

Wool sales in London on Friday amounted to 10,000 bales.
Ex-President Hopkins, of Williams College, Mass., died on the 17th inst.

An earthquake shock was felt on Monday in Smyrna and the island of Scio.
Another shock of earthquake was felt at Charleston, S. C., last Sunday at 10:07 a. m.

Bill Cody has been taking the Princess of Wales out driving on the Deadwood coach.
Six cases of smallpox among the whites were reported in San Francisco last Friday.

Over 400 Chinese laundrymen struck for higher wages in New York last Saturday.
The British bark, Afton was wrecked and totally lost at Lisieniki island in the South sea.

The new silver vault of the treasury will have a storage capacity of 100,000,000 standard silver dollars.
The custom house officers of San Francisco, captured an opium smuggler named Geo. Conner, last week.

The jurors for the trial of Jacob Sharp, the N. Y. hoodlum, have been obtained and the trial is now in progress.
Editor O'Brien reached Dublin last Sunday evening, and was received with the greatest ovation witnessed in many years.

The Southern Pacific is looking for a line for a road below the Mexican line to connect with the Southern Pacific at Yuma.
The balloon sent out by the New York World last week with the idea of reaching Massachusetts, landed in a swamp in Illinois.

A cyclone at Grand Forks, Dakota, last week destroyed over twenty-five houses. Four people were killed and the loss is \$500,000.
The Union Pacific has severed its connection with the Central Pacific and will run steamers between San Francisco and Portland.

During a squall on Lake Erie last Monday the steam barge H. Walters capsized and eight or twelve persons were drowned.
The presentation of the American testimonial to Mr. Gladstone in London has been postponed until after the jubilee festivities.

A cowboy named McCarthy was shot and killed while lying drunk on the floor of a saloon in Indianapolis, Colorado, last Thursday.
John A. Beall, aged 12, is in prison at Eaton, Ohio, charged with the murder of his mother. Fears of a lynching are entertained.

Ferron, the new French war minister, will submit a project for the creation of four new cavalry and eighteen infantry regiments.
The Crimes bill passed the committee stage last Friday. The Gladstonians and Parnellites did not vote, leaving the house in a body.

An aerolite fell early in the week near Evansville, Indiana, which weighed two tons, and buried itself over twenty-five feet in the earth.
Last Saturday, in New York, the supreme court sustained the sentence of John O'Neil, one of the hoodlum aldermen who is now in Sing Sing.

A boat containing 250 pilgrims was capsized by a hurricane while crossing the Danube river at Paks, and only a few of the party were saved.
The Countess Compa has decamped from Paris with the Viscount Delatour Garboent. The fortune of the lady amounts to about \$7,500,000.

A mob attacked the office of the Constitution, a Conservative newspaper of Cork, Ireland, last Monday, and smashed the windows of the building.
A collision of two trains occurred at Potsdam, Germany, on Sunday, in which one car burned, two women and one man were killed and several injured.

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J. J. Thomas Co., of Denver, Col., have found coal and natural gas within 300 feet of the surface on their property, eighteen miles south of the city.
A mob set fire to the Jewish quarter of the town of Duna Szerdahely, Hungary, Monday last. One hundred and twenty-five families are homeless.

Several thousand people attended the jubilee choral services held in New York last Sunday, in honor of the fiftieth anniversary of Queen Victoria's reign.
The steamer Chaplain burned last Friday night off Charlevoix, Michigan. Twenty persons are known to be drowned and seven or eight are still missing.

The stock transfer book of the Broadway Surface road produced in evidence in the Sharp trial in New York on Monday was found to be perfectly blank.
The purchase of 2,000,000 acres of land at Sonora, Mexico, for the establishment of an American colony was effected in San Francisco last Thursday by eastern capitalists.

Harold Schenk, tried for murder, at Dillon, was convicted of manslaughter and sentenced on Monday evening to ten years' confinement in the penitentiary at hard labor.
A German has been arrested at St. Medardentalles, France, on suspicion of being a spy entrusted with learning the manufacture of melinite, the new French explosive.

Mrs. Cleveland was present last Sunday at the baccalaureate sermon delivered by Rev. Dr. Frisbee, president of Wells' seminary, Aurora, New York, to the graduating class.
The floods in Hungary are subsiding and fears are now entertained that fevers will result from decaying vegetation left by the floods. The entire damage is estimated at \$500,000.

A crash in the speculations in wheat occurred in Chicago last week by which the bulls were badly done up and Kershaw & Co. are bankrupt to the tune of a very large amount.
The stage which runs between Baldwin and Barrets on the Missouri Pacific railroad in Missouri was held up by three men in masks last Sunday afternoon and \$250 secured.

James Wilson, the Philadelphia forger whose defalcations amount to \$600,000, was arrested last Saturday at Toronto, Canada, where he had been living under an assumed name for the past two months.
H. V. Lesley, who defaulted last July with \$650,200 of the Chesapeake & Delaware canal company's cash and bonds, was arrested in Philadelphia on Saturday last. He was secretary of the company.

German papers say the recovery of the emperor is slow but noticeable, but that he will require great care and rest in the future, which is conceived as hinting that he must soon pass away forever from active public duties.
Crown Solicitor Murphy intimated to the tenants at Bokyko that if they renew the offer to pay Landlord Callaghan £900 and he refuses, the government will abandon its prosecution of tenants and decline to furnish further police to aid in carrying on the evictions.

The Queen's advent into Westminster Abbey on Tuesday was arranged with more pomp and ceremony than it is possible to describe. A number of people along the route were smothered in the crush. Congratulations were received from President Cleveland.
The Supreme Court confirmed the decision of the court below in the case of Maxwell, murderer of Preller, last Saturday. The date of the execution is fixed at July 12th. An attempt will be made to bring the case before the United States Supreme Court on constitutional points.

Considerable patriotism of a tempest and teapot order was unheeded last week by an order of the President returning all the flags captured during the civil war to the government of the respective states with whose soldiers they had gone into the field. The order has since been revoked.
Audley Coote, managing director of the company formed to lay telegraph cables between Vancouver Island, B. C., and Australia, touching at Hawaii and Fiji, says construction work will be begun at once, a subsidy of \$400,000 a year having been obtained from the Canadian, Hawaiian and Australian governments.

The east-bound California express on the Southern Pacific railroad was robbed last Saturday, near Flatonia, about ninety-five miles east of San Antonio. All of the passengers were relieved of their jewelry and valuables, the express and mail car rifled, and about \$10,000 secured. The robbers, eight or ten in number, have not yet been caught.

TERRITORIAL NEWS.

Items of Interest From Both Sides of the Divide.

Notes Clipped and Condensed From Exchanges Published Within the Territory.

Diphtheria at Deer Lodge is now abating.
The Turners' picnic at Columbia Gardens, Butte, came off last Sunday.

A cemetery association has been formed in Helena, and the capital will have a new cemetery.
The railroad station at Deer Lodge has been removed from the west side to the foot of second street.

The bridge at Bearmouth was destroyed by the high water last week and all trains stopped in consequence.
It is rumored that a line of horse cars is to be put in Butte, in opposition to the Bennett electric street railway.

The citizens of Rimini, in Lewis and Clarke county are making an organized kick concerning their mail facilities.
The Butte team defeated the Three Forks eleven in a match game of cricket at Butte, last Sunday; score, 110 to 98.

David Allerdice died in a saloon in Spring Hill last week from laryngitis, caused by excessive use of strong drink.
The River Press says the Manitoba road will reach Great Falls by Sept. 1st; Col. Dodge says not until some time in November.

Eugene Wingler, the Helena barber, arrested for bigamy, was released on promise to support his legal wife. The other will sue for divorce.
Early last Monday morning, eight prisoners confined in the Helena city jail for petty offenses, made good their escape and cleared out of town.

Ex-Governor Potts died at his home in Helena last Friday. He had been suffering from aneurism of a main artery of the chest since last autumn.
A man supposed to be named Baker had a cateleptic fit in Butte on Sunday and another one early Monday morning; another one may result fatally.

The commencement exercises of the College of Montana at Deer Lodge were held on Wednesday, the 15th, and the college is now closed for the summer.
One hundred and fifty horses have been stolen from the band of Ferguson Bros., of the Judith Basin. The thieves are supposed to be Blood Indians.

John Maguire has telegraphed from Helena to Editor O'Brien an offer of \$2,500 for three lectures in Butte and Helena, with what success is not learned.
A company has been incorporated for the building of a railroad between Bozeman and Butte and the press of the two towns is doing everything possible to forward the scheme.

On Monday the coupling of the Pullman sleeper of a train crossing the Mulden pass broke, and but for the prompt action of the air-brakes a serious accident would have resulted.
A. H. Hooper, of Spring Hill, aged 23 years suicided last Thursday at John Peate's boarding house by shooting himself in the left side. He had been ill with consumption for several years and was despondent.

On Sunday, in Helena, the Journal publishing company's nine defeated the Herald nine; score, 32 to 16. In the afternoon the Helena club was victorious over the Independents by a score of 14 to 3.
Geo. F. Woolston, the waterworks man of Helena, will get his supply from wells in the valley two miles from the center of the town, whence it will be taken to a reservoir on the hills of a light sufficient for use for fire purposes.

A feature of the rapid railroad building now being done by the Manitoba road in Northern Dakota is the movable town which keeps pace with the end of the track and which is composed largely of prostitutes, gamblers and other human vultures.
All through the winter and spring the saloon keepers of Helena have been renewing and paying their licenses in advance as far as the treasurer would accept them under the belief that they would hold good until their expiration despite the increase of liquor licenses which goes into effect July 1st. It now transpires from an opinion rendered by Sanders, Cullen & Sanders that they have been too previous and will have to pay the increase.

Missoula Times: Chas. Allard and an Indian whose name we would rather not attempt to spell are raising a herd of buffalo. They started in a few years ago with four calves, two bulls and two heifers, and now have fourteen or fifteen head.
While John Decker, aged 10, was playing croquet with his father's hired man at his home near Bozeman, the latter became enraged and hit him over the head with a mallet. The injured boy is unable to speak and it is feared the brain is affected. The man has not been arrested.

Information is wanted of the whereabouts of David Smith, who was at White Sulphur Springs January last, by his brother. Anyone knowing where he is, or should this meet the eye of the wandering boy himself, they or he will confer a favor by dropping a line to Elmer Smith, White Sulphur Springs, Montana.
Last Friday afternoon at Butte, the house of J. M. Bowes, near the corner of Utah and Granite streets, toppled over and was entirely demolished while being raised to a new grade. Mrs. Bowes, wife of the owner, and 64 years of age, was in the building at the time and was instantly killed. The verdict of the coroner's jury does not exonerate the contractor from all blame in the matter though it makes no charges against him. The building was a frame, veneered with brick.
