

GENERAL MINING NEWS.

The Condition of Properties in the Territory of Montana,

and the Mineral Producing Regions Generally West of the Mississippi.

Montana.

Placer mines throughout the territory are getting plenty of water this year.

Many prospects are being opened up north and west of the Moulton and Alice, Butte.

The Clark's Fork & Cooke City railroad it is hoped will be completed by one year from next fall.

At the Orphan Girl, at Butte, a cross-cut has developed a vein of 17 feet and the wall is not yet reached.

The Elkhorn Mining company, of Montana, have paid another dividend aggregating \$5,000, making \$25,000 paid this year, and \$180,522 to date.

The output of the Jay Gould mine for the month of June was \$20,000, or \$2,000 for each of its stamps. The mine is still looking well in all its workings.

The output of the Empire mine at Gloster, on the east side, was \$1,500 for the month of June. Fifteen stamps were dropped 29 1/2 days on 615 tons of ore.

The Shoo Fly, in Cooke City district, has had one thousand tons of ore worked in the Republic smelter, that have netted \$25,000. There are at present some three or four hundred tons in the dump.

The Stillwater mine is situated on Stillwater creek, near Cooke City, and the Monroe is in the same district. They both show up well, though the veins are very small. The Elkhorn, in the same district, has plenty of fair ore in sight.

The putting in of new piers, and other work, in connection with trouble from water has reduced the June output of the Elkhorn, in Jefferson county, to practically nothing. The usual monthly dividend of \$5,000 was, however, paid on the 1st of July.

Tom Levegood, of Anaconda, came up yesterday to Butte, says the Inter Mountain, and brought a couple of car loads of iron ore, from the Black Chief mine, which he sold to the Butte reduction works for fluxing purposes. He reports great activity in prospecting about Anaconda, but no important strikes.

Henry Cassert, interested in the mines about Cooke City, says the crying need of the district is a railroad. Development is greatly impeded on account of the necessity of freightling ores clear to Cinnabar, the end of the Northern Pacific track. There are at present between two and three hundred men in the district.

The Republic company, of Cooke City, owned chiefly by Philadelphia parties, has put up a smelter of 40-ton capacity, and have developed sufficiently to make sure that they have got a mine. The ores in this mine, as most of the mines of the district, carry lead, silver and gold, and tend strongly to copper with depth.

The Black Warrior, of Cooke City, is situated not far from the Republic, and is developed by two shafts, 60 and 100 feet. The ore body is 20 feet in width. Two tunnels are being driven to strike the lead at 100 and 300 in depth. The lower tunnel is in 180 feet. The upper tunnel was driven 120 feet when it struck the lead where it was pinched. A winze was sunk from this point, and, at the depth of 150 feet, struck an ore body of galena and carbonates.

Miscellaneous. El Dorado county, California, is having a genuine mining boom.

Bullion receipts at the Salt Lake banks for the week ending June 22nd were \$180,522.

In a new mill building, in Lewis district, Nevada, Huntington crushers are to be used instead of stamps.

A bedrock tunnel, in Hungarian hill, Plumas county, California, has struck gravel which pays an ounce a day and promises to hold out.

The tailings in Bear river, California, are to be worked for the purpose of getting the quicksilver and what other metals may be found in them.

Between the east branch of Nelson creek and the north branch of the Yuba, in Plumas county, California, 480 ounces of nuggets have been picked up in two months by two men.

At the Yellow Jacket mine, on the Comstock, last week, Joseph Kinniken was fatally injured by being caught between a wall plate and the deck of a descending cage.

A correspondent of the F. & M. Record of New York, says the carbonic acid gas used at the Con. Cal-Cal. Virginia for putting out the fires in the workings has undoubtedly done its work.

Stibnite (sulphide of antimony) and galena have been discovered in a new district in Colorado, at the head of Troublesome gulch. Prospectors are beginning to flock to that locality.

The water right of the Tiger mine, in Idaho, taken up some two years ago, was jumped last week by owners of the Poorman lead, on the ground of failure on the part of the Tiger people to comply with the water-right law. A large dam, constructed by the original locators, was

blown up by the Poorman superintendent and his men, by means of giant powder, who were then driven off of the disputed ground by the Tiger men, armed with rifles. It seems to be the general impression that the Poorman company will win in the end.

An accident occurred at the Metcalf mine, Clifton, Arizona, by which John Acosta was killed and three other men wounded. It was caused by using an iron bar in tamping a charge of powder in blasting.

An Austrian miner named Miatevich, who was working in the 600-foot level of the Kennedy mine, Amador county, California, accidentally stepped into the shaft and fell a distance of about 400 feet into the sump at the bottom, killing him instantly and mangleing his head and body in a frightful manner.

In one of the tunnels of the Hite mine, at Hite's cove, Mariposa county, California, John Kummer was caught by a slab of slate from the foot-wall of the mine, 9 feet long, 6 feet wide, and of an average thickness of 2 feet. It tilted over against him, pinning him fast. His right shoulder was crushed and all the vital organs materially injured.

The Golden Chest in Idaho is the first gold quartz mine in the country on which a mill was erected. Twenty-seven thousand dollars was soon produced. For some time W. H. Pettit has been the superintendent. He has worked on the plan to have a thoroughly developed mine before he starts his mill, and he is thorough in his business. He has now about 7,000 tons of pay ore in sight.

Ten Broeck, the Racer.

Ten Broeck, the great race horse, who died on the old Harper farm last week, was owned by Frank B. Harper and valued at \$75,000. Ten Broeck was foaled on the Harper farm at Midway in 1872. He ran the fastest four miles ever known, 7:15 3/4, in 1876, and his record for a mile, 1:39 3/4, and two miles, 3:27 1/2, have never been beaten, and only Drake Carter, his son, lowered his three-mile record. He was the hero of many a hard race and was never beaten except by Parole. This was in 1887, when he was out of condition. His last appearance on the race course was at the Louisville Jockey club's track on July 4th, 1878, in a four-mile race for \$10,000 a side, against Mollie McCarthy, the California crack, who up to this time had been unbeaten. The day was sultry and the track so sticky that Mollie McCarthy failed to go the distance and was shut out in the first heat. Ten Broeck himself was shut out in the first heat. What in anticipation was the greatest race ever run, turned out to be a very tame affair. After this he was placed in the stud at Harper's stock farm. Harper was offered \$100,000 cash for him a him a day or two after Parole beat him, but refused the offer.
