

VIGILANTES.

A Large Party of Men Gives Three Claim Jumpers Their Walking Papers.

quietness and Order Prevailed--Two of the Men Return, The Third Goes to Helena.

About 12:20 o'clock Friday morning a crowd of men marched four abreast down the streets of Philipsburg to the Silver Lake Hotel. This body of men was a detachment of a vigilance committee, which had captured at Husmark the jumpers of the Granite Belle, Louis Demars and Samuel Tolman, and had escorted them to a point below camp, where they were await the return of the force sent to town. The detachment upon arriving at the Silver Lake Hotel, formed a semi-circle around the door, and after clearing the street of all such belated pedestrians as happened to pass by and who were naturally attracted by the unusual spectacle, the leader detailed three of the vigilantes

Late Superintendent of the San Francisco and North Granite syndicates, who was implicated in recent jumping of the North Granite property, and who occupied a room on the second floor. After about 10 minutes they re-appeared with Mr. Currie in their custody. The body of men then marched down the street to a point in the neighborhood of the depot site where the rest of the party was waiting with the other prisoners. The three men were then given to understand that they were to leave the country.

From the numerous conflicting accounts it appears that Demars and Tolman suffered more or less violence at the hands of the masked party, a rope and much talk of hanging being brought into play.

Officer Dolby, getting wind of the affair, informed Deputy Sheriff George Hammond, who quickly organized a posse. By this time, however, the affair was about over, and Demars, Tolman and Currie had already left town. In the morning, when things had quieted down and the vigilantes had dispersed as mysteriously as they had appeared, Demars and Tolman came back to camp; but Currie went down the road and was seen at Stone Station by parties coming up from there this afternoon. Tolman and Demars swore out warrants for a number whom they claim to have recognized as among the capturing party. No one seems to have been aware last evening of what was going to happen during the night, and such was the smoothness with which the affair was conducted, that the occupant of the

was not awakened during the process of taking the latter out. Spectators who from the sidewalk were witness to the grimly silent procession as it filed through the deserted streets seem to have been so much interested in viewing the spectacle, and finding out without approaching too near just what was going on, that no careful count of the number of masks was made. This doubt as to the size of the capturing party is further to be accounted for from the fact that there were two separate and distinct parties who did not come together until well below town, where there was no prying eyes to count their numbers. One man who claims to have counted says there were forty-five masks, and the number varies, according to the testimony of other witnesses, from this to twenty-five.

Rumor says that jumping has become unpopular. The latest josh--"When did you get back, and how far down did you go?" Two other men besides the three captured were diligently hunted for, but could not be found.

The first rumor of the morning was to the effect that the vigilantes were composed of Cornishmen, from Granite.

Sheriff Lew Coleman, who happened to have been on his way over here from Deer Lodge, reached town just before dinner, but says he knew nothing of the affair until he met some of the party down the road.

Two men who happened to witness the night's affair were rather roughly handled by the storming party, for exhibiting too much curiosity. They were soon convinced that discretion was the better part of valor.

Miner, July 20th: Charles Aspling, of Anaconda, brought good news of the Flint Creek mine yesterday. He says the Flint

MINES AND MINING.

The mines of the Mineral Hill, Missoula county, are attracting universal attention.

Butte parties in from Flathead county report that district in a most flourishing condition.

The gold and silver bullion deposited at the U. S. Assay Office in Helena during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1887, is for gold, \$1,313,426.79; and for silver, \$8,483.50, making a total of \$1,411,910.29

The Gardner News says that Russell's process is proving a wonderful success at Pioche and vicinity, making it profitable to work 5 ounces of silver which could not be worked before when carrying 15 ounces.

The shaft on the Jackson vein, Pioneer district, Deer Lodge county, is down about 100 feet. Some ore runs as high as \$74 ounces to the ton, but it is only an exceptional case. The average width of ore is about fifteen inches, and is very fair, but it lies in pockets mostly.

The Major Budd mine near Boulder, Jefferson county, owned by Henry Nickel, Major Budd, Dan Welsh, Dr. Thompson, Charley Nickel and Albert P. Nickel has been disposed of to a St. Louis syndicate for a consideration of \$110,000 who will take hold in a few days. The sale was made last Thursday.

The water in the Elkhorn is still up to about the 450-foot level, but is slowly receding under the work of the heavy pumping plant. Every energy is being devoted to getting the mine cleared of water and the mill is not running, though the shut-down is being improved in making some repairs.

J. C. Johnson, of Walkerville, is one of a company operating the Krao mine, located at Koolenai Lake, British Columbia. A ton and a half of ore taken from the mine and sent to Mr. Johnson a few days ago went 287 ounces in silver and 43 per cent lead and netted \$370.16. The Krao is down 100 feet and the ledge is at least 30 feet wide.

Independent: The Penn Placer company, which lately bought a large area of placer ground near Basin, Jefferson county, is now in such shape that the manager hopes to be washing gravel in a week or ten days. The company has been delayed by the non-arrival of freight, but it is now in Helena and only awaits transportation to the ground. It is universally believed that the company has some very rich ground.

The Doherty brothers have what is described as a fabulously rich gold mine at Trout creek, near New York gulch, Lewis and Clarke county. The lead is wide and the ore pays well throughout, while in pockets occur bodies of ore of surpassing richness. The rock blossoms with native gold. It is said they have been offered \$200,000 for the property, and, though they first thought to accept it, they struck a very rich spot at the critical moment and refused to part with it.

The Poorman, in the Coeur d'Alene, on a vein of which the celebrated Tiger is an extension, has recently been bonded to Patrick Clark and B. C. Kingsbury, of Butte. Three adit tunnels have been driven 125 feet apart, each for a distance of 100 feet, and each following from the mouth to the face a regular, well defined and continuous vein of ore from 3 to 4 feet in width and assaying in silver from 50 to 60 ounces and in lead from 60 to 80 per cent. The face of each level is in ore of high grade and each will be driven ahead as rapidly as men and money can do the work. One thousand tons of rich ore are already on the dump and many thousand tons are in sight in the tunnel workings.

The following are the developments on the Mountain View mine, lately consolidated with the Montana Copper company: The shaft is a two-compartment and is down to a depth of six hundred and thirty feet. The levels are also quite extensive, especially the five and six hundred, but just how many feet of levels there are Mr. Couch is not prepared to state. The work that is to be begun at once is the sinking of the shaft below the present depth. The shaft will be made a three-compartment shaft from the surface. The development of the mine will be immediate and extensive, and a large force of men will be put to work. The Mountain View adjoins the Anaconda and is one of the richest in the district.
