

MINING NEWS.

Montana.

The Pollock mine, Butte, is working sixty men.

Miner, 17th: It is reported on the street that the Anaconda and St. Lawrence start up again this morning.

Husbandman: Prospecting is about over now until next June. This will give an opportunity for the development of the mines already discovered, and will be a good thing for the camps about the Springs.

Inter Mountain, 16th: The first matte produced by the Boston & Montana Consolidated was taken out to-day about six tons. One blast was started this morning, and two more will be started in a day or two.

Madisonian: John C. Stock, of Silver Star, has bonded his mine to an Italian company for ten thousand dollars. The company, we are informed, is well satisfied with the property, and the sale will doubtless be consummated shortly.

Articles of incorporation of the Minah Consolidated have been filed. The company consists of five patented mines, and the Evening Star group, containing five mines, all located in Jefferson county.

New Idea: At the Carlew mine in the Bitter Root valley the men are now at work driving a drift at the 200-foot level in the main shaft, a double compartment, being down 310 feet. They intend to connect the drift with the Elizabeth tunnel.

Articles of incorporation of the Pollock mining company, operating in Butte, have been filed with the secretary of the territory. The incorporators are Ellis Wainwright, Geo. D. Capen, Geo. H. Blake, C. H. Hand and H. C. Caney, all of St. Louis.

The Drum Lummon Company are making great improvements around Marysville. They have established electric lights in various parts of the town, also have a good supply of water to put out fires, also fire alarms and a fire company to attend all fires.

Independent: Spruille Braden, superintendent of the United States assay office, Helena, says that in the neighborhood of \$1,000,000 in placer gold has been received in his office this year. He thinks the receipts will be much larger, as clean-ups in the mines have only fairly begun. The placer gold output in the territory this year will considerably exceed that of last.

Livingston Enterprise: The Castle Mountain boom continues unabated and bids fair to increase instead of diminish. Scores of prospectors, experts and adventurers are flocking into the camp. Reports are received here that every day new leads are being discovered and large bodies of rich ore are being exposed to view as the development work progresses in the principal mines being worked under bond.

Articles of incorporation of the Ceur d'Alene Silver-Lead mining company have been filed, with its principal place of business in Butte City, Montana. The capital stock of the company is to be \$5,000,000, in 500,000 shares of a par value of \$10 each. The following are the trustees for the first three months of the existence of the corporation: Joseph K. Clark, H. L. Frank, John Noyes, B. C. Kingsbury, Patrick Clark, John M. Burke and W. P. Gwin.

The output of gold and silver of the Alpha and Omega mine, located in the Stemple district, within twenty miles of Helena, for a run of twenty days by a 5-stamp mill, was \$3,500 in gold and \$2,500 in silver. This product is in the shape of a silver brick worth \$2,500, which was on exhibition in the Second National Bank's window, at Helena, and a gold mine of \$3,500 in the Assay Office. The Alpha and Omega is supposed to be an extension of the reliable Homestake, owned by Hershfield, Negus & Jacobs, and one whose profits foot up a cool fifty thousand annually.—Herald.

Independent: Certificate of incorporation of the Penn Yan mining company have been filed in the office of the county recorder. The incorporators, four in number, are H. H. Hill and John Maulshagen, of Wickes, and E. W. Knight and H. M. Pachen, of Helena, who in connection with W. C. Baskett of the Granite, are also the trustees of the concern. The object of the association is the transaction of a general mining business in the territory of Montana, and especially the operating of the Pen Yan mining properties near Wickes.

The Monument mining company, of Montana, has filed with the county recorder its certificate of incorporation. The incorporators are O. M. Towner, Carroll E. Gates, Frank Chaloner, J. H. Shober, Nathan S. Vestal and I. William Adams, who, with George W. Warder, of Kansas City, Mo., are also the trustees. Capital stock \$10,000,000, divided into 1,000,000 shares of the par value of \$10 each. Object mining in Montana territory. The property involved in the above incorporation is the Monument lode, situated about eight miles south of Butte and in the neighborhood of the Apex property.

Review: Articles of incorporation of the Georgetown Consolidated mining company have been filed in Secretary Webb's office. The purpose of the company is the business of mining for gold,

Independent: A mining proposition just now attracting no little attention is that of the Nevada Creek Placer company organized last week. The ground involved is that worked by W. B. Raleigh of this city for the past few years, and which has always yielded well, and this year produced the magnificent display of nuggets that have excited so much comment during the past few days. The property has now been taken by a local company, of which the following are the incorporators: Chas. A. Broadwater, president; J. W. Bailey (of Missouri), vice president; W. B. Raleigh, secretary-treasurer; E. W. Knight, H. M. Pachen and T. H. Kleinschmidt. The capital stock is \$2,500,000 in shares of \$2.50 each.

Idaho.

Blackfoot (Idaho) News: A private letter from Soda Springs gives us the information: The quartz mill is en route to Cariboo. Horsely's mill at Cariboo is in operation and that camp is booming.

The last payment on the Arlington mine, in the Salmon River district, Idaho, amounting to \$27,000, was made through the Traders' National bank of Spokane Falls last week. This is a pretty good pick-up for the original owners of the Arlington, and it represents only a portion of this summer's work.

The Gate City mine, Slaughter-House gulch, Idaho, not over two miles from Bellevue, and owned by James and Wm. McWade, was sold yesterday to the Granite Mountain mining company, of Montana, for \$12,000. The conditions of the sale are \$2,000 cash down, \$3,000 in 30 days, and the balance of \$7,000 in 60 days. Sept. 6th ten men were put to work on the Gate City, to develop it as much as possible before the 30 days expire for the second payment.

Murray (Idaho) Sun: Joseph K. and Wm. Clark, of Butte, have bought the Big Bug mine, adjoining the Sunset, in Carbon district, from Phil A. Markson, for \$10,000. The same parties bought the Sunset last spring for \$17,000, and Jos. K. Clark informed a Sun reporter last evening that it could not be purchased for half a million. Carbon district promises to play an important part in the history of Ceur d'Alene, and we would not be surprised to see it the rival of Wardner, Burke and Mullan districts before another year rolls around. The Carbon district is the nearest silver district to Murray, and by the end of next week can be reached in two hours' easy travel.

Miscellaneous.

Quicksilver exports by sea from San Francisco in August were 671 flasks valued at \$26,217.

During the past month nearly 200 mineral locations have been made in Siskiyou county, Cal., and several large mining sales have been recorded.

The Colorado Central mining company, of Colorado, will pay October 10th, their eighteenth dividend of five cents a share, aggregating \$13,740, making \$254,500 paid to date.

The Standard of Bodie, California, declared a dividend of five cents a share, aggregating \$5,000, payable October 12. The company had a cash balance of about \$44,000 on September 1st.

The Truckee (Cal.) Republican says: Work will soon be commenced in the erection of some large crosses, which will mark the spot where the Donner party built their cabins in the memorable fall of 46.

The Deadwood Terra mining company, of Dakota, paid September 20th, their twenty-ninth dividend, of ten cents a share, aggregating \$20,000, making \$60,000 paid this year, and \$300,000 paid to date.

M. & S. Press: The proposed development of the iron mines of Oregon is an important thing for this coast. The company expect at present to turn out 40 to 50 tons of charcoal pig per day. The time will soon come when California's iron interests will command more attention.

Park (Utah) Record: Snake creek district and all that part of the great mineral bearing zone south and west of the Ontario and other old established properties of the camp, is on the eve of making a very encouraging and flattering record. The developments in that infantile district, while begun at a late period and on a small scale, show rich rewards for the hardy prospector and the capitalist alike.

Traits of Criminals.

An Italian scientist, Marro, finds that criminals are more apt than moral people to be the descendants of very young and very old parents, in opposition to parents of middle age; and the same is true of the insane. In a table founded on 865 normal men, 556 criminals and 100 insane, 88 per cent. of normal men were born of parents in the growing period of life, 66.1 per cent. of parents in maturity, and 24.9 per cent. of parents who had

already reached the declining period of life. Similar percentages for criminals are 10.9, 56.7 and 32.2, and for the insane, 17.0, 47.0 and 36.0. The same writer also finds that the bodily temperature of criminals is slightly higher than that of normal persons, being about 37.07 degrees C. in thirty cases he examined.
