## GENERAL NEWS.

**Doings Throughout the World and  
the Nation.**

**Items Taken From the Latest Tele-  
graphic Reports on Subjects  
of Interest.**

A fresh outbreak of Texas fever has ap-  
peared at Tekamah, Neb.

The third national convention of the  
Women's Relief Corps met in St. Louis  
yesterday.

A French fishing boat has been sunk in  
the English channel, and eighteen per-  
sons drowned.

Reports are in circulation of the re-  
newal of Prince Frederick William's  
throat trouble.

Patron, the trotting wonder, lost the  
special race for \$3,000 to Clingstone, at  
Detroit, last Saturday.

Rails were torn up on a railroad in  
Cork, Tuesday, over which the police had  
to pass to aid in evictions.

Anarchist Oscar Neebo was taken to  
Joliet, secretly, last Monday night, to be-  
gin his fifteen-year sentence.

Rioting is reported on the Spanish is-  
land of Ponapi, in consequence of the ex-  
pulsion of Protestant missionaries.

The first Southern Pacific through  
train since the recent storm left Tucson,  
Arizona, for the east, Monday afternoon.

Cardinal Gibbons reached Chicago,  
Tuesday, on his way to Portland, and  
was given a reception by the archbishop.

Charles Blevins and John Graham,  
outlaws, were killed by a sheriff's posse  
last Thursday, in Pleasant Valley, Ariz-  
ona.

Balfour has been asked by unionist  
members of parliament to prevent  
O'Brien from continuing his "incendiary  
speeches."

It is reported from Cairo, Egypt, that  
beyond Wady Halfa a hundred lives have  
been lost in floods caused by the rising  
of the Nile.

Principal Officer Bell of the Thistle,  
thinks there must have been something  
wrong with the cutter's bottom and will  
investigate.

John Kernaghan was hanged at San  
Francisco last Friday for the murder of  
his sister-in-law, Martha Ann Hood, in  
October, 1885.

It is reported in Topeka, Kansas, that  
Mayor Melsker will appoint Mrs. M. E.  
DeGeer, the well known female lawyer  
as police judge.

Bailiffs, protected by police, attempted  
to seize the cattle of a tenant at Kil-  
barry, Ireland, but were driven off by the  
crowd, Monday.

The postmaster general of Canada has  
confessed to bribery in his election to the  
Dominion parliament, and his Nova Scotian  
seat is vacated.

A passenger train on the Mobile &  
Ohio railroad was thrown from a trestle  
near Jackson, Tenn., Tuesday, and a  
number of persons injured.

The light-weight championship match  
between Jack McAuliffe, of Brooklyn,  
and Jim Carney, of England, has been  
postponed until October 31.

The Salt Lake chamber of commerce  
has sent a communication to the Butte  
board of trade inviting co-operation  
against the Union Pacific's extortionate  
freight rates.

The Grand Army veterans were given  
a magnificent reception at the St. Louis  
Merchants' Exchange, Tuesday night, at  
which Mayor Francis made an eloquent  
welcome address.

Russell M. P., attempted to address  
a unionist meeting at Plymouth, last  
Monday evening, but there was so much  
opposition and hissing and hooting that  
he could not proceed.

The American boat, the Volunteer,  
beat the Scotch vessel, Thistle, in New  
York harbor, Tuesday, by more than an  
hour. The wind was favorable to the  
Thistle, but she lost it and the race by  
tacking too close to the shore.

Three children while playing on the  
Leland at Quebec last Saturday where  
the artillery competition was recently  
held, found a shell and lit the fuse. The  
bomb exploded and all were killed.

Active measures have been initiated for  
raising the necessary funds in the provin-  
ces of Manitoba for the completion of  
the Red River road. The city of Winni-  
peg has taken hold of the matter and will  
contribute \$250,000. The remaining  
three-quarters of a million will doubtless  
be raised among local capitalists.

## TERRITORIAL NEWS.

**Items of Interest From Both Sides  
of the Divide.**

**Notes Clipped and Condensed From  
Exchanges Published Within  
the Territory.**

The track on the Helena & Northern  
is now laid seven miles and the company  
hopes to have trains running to Marys-  
ville by the middle of October.

The Northern Pacific has issued, to  
take effect September 27th, a new stock  
tariff that embodies a number of great  
reductions on cattle and sheep from Bil-  
dings, Merrill and Helena.

Patrick Griffin, who met with an acci-  
dent at Townsend, last week, while driv-  
ing a reaper, is pronounced out of dan-  
ger by the attending physician. His leg  
is not broken, as at first thought.

Will Thomas, stock inspector of Cho-  
teau county, says horses are dying in  
large numbers on the Dearborn and in  
that vicinity. The disease is the same  
as that on the Chestnut range last fall.

Missonlian: The Missonla bridge was as  
far completed Wednesday as to allow the  
laying of the track, and its stability was  
tested yesterday morning at 7 o'clock by  
the locomotive and eight cars of ties and  
steel.

Last Thursday morning at 1 o'clock  
Clara Gilchrist, alias "Big Clara," a  
waiter girl at the Theater Comique died  
at her room on Lower Arizona street,  
Butte, from an overdose of morphine.  
The drug was not taken with suicidal  
intent.

The contract for the grading of the  
Rocky Fork & Cooke City railroad has  
been let to Jones & Francis. Mr. Jones,  
of this firm, is a well known railroad con-  
tractor in Northern Pacific construction  
days, having run the Jones cut on the  
Bozeman divide.

A race has been arranged to take place  
between Jack Dowd's horse, which bears  
his name, and a bay filly owned by R. P.  
Burch, at Anaconda. The race is to be  
for \$250 a side, and a quarter of a mil-  
lion distance. Anaconda will back the filly  
to a considerable extent on the side.

There was a big meeting at Great Falls  
last Saturday, to make arrangements to  
celebrate the completion of the Manitoba  
grade to that point. It is practically  
finished. The construction of the branch  
line to Sand Conlee starts this week.  
Chief Engineer Roberts and other rail-  
road men are in town.

Inter Mountain, 24th: Information  
was received in Butte to-day that Judge  
Galbraith was injured by a backing  
broncho the day before yesterday. He  
had gone out on a hunt with Frank Mills  
when the accident occurred. He was  
brought back to Dewey's Flat yesterday  
and is comfortably fixed there.

A tourist printer answering the des-  
cription of Todd, who worked in the  
Chronicle office during the spring, died  
recently at Minot from delirium tremens.  
No name is given by the Mandan Pioneer,  
which publishes the item, but other cir-  
cumstances are strongly suggestive that  
Todd is the unfortunate. Courier.

Surveyor General Greene has received  
orders to immediately arrange for resur-  
veying the south boundary of the Crow  
Indian reservation from the Big Horn  
river to the southeastern corner of that  
reservation, and from the Montana base  
line to the Yellowstone river, along the  
eastern boundary of the reserve. The  
lines thus run are to be marked with per-  
manent and substantial monuments, iron  
preferred.
