

MINING NEWS.

Montana.

The foundation for the chutes at the Wake-Up Jim mine at Butte has been completed, as has also the framing of the timbers.

The Boston & Montana Copper and Silver mining company are rapidly pushing work on their new hoisting works, and expect to have them completed in about two weeks. The new machinery will not arrive for some time.

Miner: The owners of the Telegraph lode which is situated on the Little Blackfoot River, are negotiating with Eastern parties for the sale of their mine. The Telegraph contains a large body of gold-bearing arsenical ore.

At the Bullion, near Elliston, eleven men are employed drifting east and west on the 240-foot level. The ore taken from this mine is a lead carbonate and runs high in silver—between 200 and 300 ounces per ton. It also runs about 50 or 60 per cent lead.

The people of Livingston have great expectations of benefit from the Castle mines. They have subscribed \$800 to build a road into the camp, and the commissioners of Park county have caused a donation from the county of \$1,000 towards the project.

Drifting still continues in the shaft of the Blue Bird at Butte. The shaft has been sunk to the bed of the creek, just below the mill. The Cornish pump, which is to be operated by a cable from the mill, has not as yet been started, though the cable has been in position nearly two months.

The Hammill brothers, of Wickes, have organized a company to operate the Crown Point and Jewel lodes, in Cataract district, the company name being taken from the name of the property. They have assays running as high as \$167.80 in gold and silver, and none less than \$100. They justly believe they have a bonanza.

Husbandman: The miners who had the contract on the Hidden Treasure, sunk eighty feet in thirty days, having completed their work several days ago. Mr. Esler is expected over soon, and it is likely he will make arrangements for running crosscuts and levels. The mine is looking well at the bottom of the shaft.

The Penn Yan company, Jefferson county, has run a level 100 feet west from the 90-foot shaft. The level was along the foot-wall and at the distance of 100 feet the vein was cut nineteen feet to the hanging-wall. Of this, about two-thirds the width is ore worth \$50 per ton, and the balance second-class ore—\$40 per ton.

The Hidden Treasure mine, situated on the south fork of the Little Blackfoot river, was bonded on the 4th inst. by Messrs. Martin & Dixon to L. D. Haws & Co., of St. Paul, for \$40,000. \$5,000 being paid in ninety days. The same company has already put a force of men to work grading a road from the mill site to the mine over which machinery for a 20-ton plant can be hauled.

The Pollock's new hoist is about enclosed. The dimensions of the main building are 75x25 feet, and 36 feet to the top of the gallow's frame. The ledge is ten feet wide, all ore, no sorting at all being necessary, and so far has milled over 100 ounces to the ton. When the company will have completed this new hoist it intends to erect one of the same dimensions on its Glenardin property.

The latest local mining excitement centers about the Edelweiss, situated near the head of Clancy creek and owned by E. Knight, R. S. Hale, E. W. Beattie, T. G. Merrill and J. S. Dunn, all of this city. A nine foot tunnel now carries in its face five feet of galena ore, worth \$70 per ton. Messrs. Knight, Hale and Beattie paid \$500 for their share of the property, and an expenditure of about \$100 has placed nearly the whole \$600 on the dump. The owners will probably organize a close company for more convenient handling of the property.

The custom mills in this vicinity are completely overrun with work, all their ore bins being full to overflowing. Considerable excitement prevails among lessees of properties on account of the death of ore. At the Bonanza the chutes are full, though arrangements have been made to have the ore reduced at the Moulton. The Moulton is being supplied with fifty tons of ore daily by the Murray Fraction. A great many mines are being worked under lease, as is clearly demonstrated by the manner in which the ore is being shipped.—Miner.

Miscellaneous.

The mining revival in Tombstone gives constant evidence of increased volume and permanency.

Mills have been constructed in New Mexico this year says the Southwest Sentinel which have a combined capacity of nearly 300 tons of ore a day.

The payrolls of the Comstock mines for last month amounted to about \$190,000. A camp that pays that much wages monthly must be far from a "played-out" one.—M. & S. Press.

The Lone Tree placers in the Vixen mining district, Montrose county, Col., have been sold to the Montrose Placer mining company of St. Louis, the consideration being \$150,000—one-third down.

M. & S. Press: The finding of new placers in the Blue Mountains, not far from Nogales, Arizona, is causing some

excitement in Arizona and Sonora; and new placers are also announced as having been discovered in Lower California. Favorable reports, too, come from the Yukon placers, Alaska.

The Feather has been turned through the Big Bend tunnel, Butte county, Cal., and a number of prospect holes have been sunk in the river-bed with very favorable indications. In places the rich gravel deposit is many feet thick. It will take next season's work, however, to prove what the general results will be, though the prospects are very favorable.

The Extension G. M. Co. has been formed to acquire by purchase, location or otherwise, mines, water rights, mills and mill sites, reduction work and all other classes of mining property, and especially to develop the Giant mine in Amador county, California. Capital stock \$500,000, Rich of San Francisco, and D. D. Reeves and William G. Way, of Plymouth, Amador county, as directors.

Virginia (Nev.) Report: At a meeting of the stockholders of the Consolidated California & Virginia mine, the secretary submitted his report, giving receipts and disbursements for the year. The bullion product of the mine amounted to \$3,523,390, of which \$1,458,005 was gold and \$2,064,924 silver. Balance of cash on hand, \$67,441. The following board of directors was elected for the ensuing year, Charles H. Fish, A. B. Hull, Cornelius O'Connor, George R. Walls and A. B. Havens. C. H. Fish was elected president; A. B. Hull, vice president; and A. B. Havens, secretary. Stock to the amount of 210,726 shares out of 216,000 in the corporation were represented.
