

MINING NEWS.

Montana.

Last week Tom Treloar was crushed to death in the east drift of the Speculator mine at Butte.

The Pollock company of Butte have added two more boilers to those they have now in use.

The Highland mine at Butte, the property of Dr. James Larkin, after six months of very unsuccessful work, was shut down last week until the coming spring.

Independent, 20th: Yesterday was a great day for the Empire mining company, twenty stamps of the new mill being started and twenty more promising to commence dropping in a week or ten days.

Mr. Burbridge, former manager of the Butte Reduction Works, Butte, says work is progressing very favorably at his mine, and that he has sixty tons of fine milling ore on the dump, the proceeds of last week's work. Miner.

An important quartz discovery is reported to have been made in the hills back of the Boulder hot springs in Jefferson county. The location takes in the springs, bath houses and hotel. The notice has been filed for record.

The water is now out of the Elkhorn mine, the big pump is in working order and ore is being mined in large quantities. The mill is being thoroughly overhauled. New pans, another furnace and five more stamps are being put in, and when the mill resumes it will be a complete 20-stamp mill.

A large number of ledges have been cut during the driving of the Monitor tunnel in Park canyon, near Butte, some of which have returned very flattering assays. The company own considerable property in that vicinity, and will push their works to develop not only their own ground, but will also determine the value of all the adjoining property.

The production of the seven principal Lake Superior mines for the first eight months of this year has been 21,984 tons (2,000 lbs.) fine mat, against 23,095 tons during the same period of last year. In consequence of the fire the Calumet & Hecla production for August fell off 1,162 tons fine, and a similar falling off is expected for September.

The Penn placer claims on Basin creek have a gang of five carpenters laying frame in the bed and bars of that stream. They have a force of forty miners at work on the claims, getting ready for next season's work. They have one little giant at work, and are putting in another. Judging from the "yellow boys" so freely circulated by the Penn men, we think the owners are regular "gold-bugs."

Mining Journal: Articles of incorporation of the Richmond company have been filed in the office of the territorial secretary. The incorporators are Chas. E. Tower, Will O'Keefe, and Andrew F. Burleigh, and these with A. C. Logan and Wm. Treacy, constitute the board of trustees. The capital is fixed at \$1,000,000-200,000 shares at \$5 each. The mining property is located in Deer Lodge county; principal office, Helena.

Husbandman: We were shown some specimens of coal this week from the coal mine of Rees & Dunn on Sixteen-Mile creek, that gives promise of being the outcrop of a valuable deposit. This is from a new find. The strata is five feet thick and we are assured extends over a country thirty miles in extent, about one-half of it being on railroad land. Messrs. Rees & Dunn now have a force of men at work and expect to open up the mine in good shape before winter.

The several properties on Ophir hill in the Cedar d'Alene district, have been bonded to C. D. Porter, of Salt Lake City for sixty days. The total price agreed to is \$100,000. It is too soon to announce particulars regarding the intentions of the purchaser. In all probability the sale will be consummated and the mines of Ophir hill will soon become a bee-hive of mining industry. This adds another bright star in the galaxy which is rapidly unfolding in the gold belt.

Miscellaneous.

The Boston and Colorado smelting company have declared a dividend of two and one-half per cent.

The receipts of bullion (excluding all ores) in Salt Lake City for the nine months of 1886 have aggregated \$3,572,266.

The Surinam Gold mining company paid October 17th, dividend No. 3, of five cents a share, aggregating \$30,000, and making \$75,000 paid to date.

S. F. Mining and Scientific Press: Some time ago Barnes & Kehoe loosened a cube of lead and silver ore in the White Hill mine, California, that weighed two tons.

The Deadwood Terra mining company, of Dakota, will pay, October 28th, dividend No. 30, of 10 cents a share, aggregating \$20,000, making \$80,000 paid to date.

The Con. Cal. & Va. ore out at the current week shows a daily average of four hundred tons, which is very nearly double the average daily shipments at any time subsequent to last June.

New sluices are being laid in several places in Six-Mile canyon, near Virginia, Nevada, and old ones have been repaired. The water wheels are spinning and the stamps are droppin g.

Discoveries of gold and coal are announced in San Luis Obispo county, Cal. In one place it is stated there are evidences of work having been done in remote times, and it is supposed that the Mexicans at one time worked the mine.

The product of the Ontario mine, Utah, for the nine months of this year has been 817,453 fine ozs. of silver; ore sales, \$598,462. From this the regular monthly dividends of \$75,000 each have been paid with the utmost regularity; a stream which has yielded for this year to date \$675,000, and \$8,600,000 in all.

S. F. Mining and Scientific Press: The mill which burned recently at the Sierra Buttes mine, Cal., was not the fine 60-stamp "Yuba mill" near the river, but the old Hitchcock mill. It has 50 stamps, but only 20 were in use. The mill itself amounted to but little, being very old and about worn out. It was up on the hill at tunnel No. 7.

The greatest mineral discovery ever made in the Black Range district, New Mexico, was made in the Readjuster mine, at Rock Cliff. While sinking the shaft, a cave was encountered four feet wide, 40 feet from floor to ceiling and length undetermined. The cave has two perfect walls smooth and slick. Ore taken from the drift at the opening of the cave gave returns of 409 ozs. silver and \$15.60 in gold to the ton.

L. C. Fyhris, who had a bond on the Golden Circle group of mines at Gibbonsville, Idaho, has effected their sale to J. F. Carter, of Philadelphia. The purchase includes eleven distinct mines, all more or less developed, a ten-stamp mill, a very valuable water power, chlorination works and all the buildings formerly used as accommodations for the men and processes used in the past for the extracting of the gold.

Parties who have prospected the Tarkou river, Alaska, this fall say that they found gold along the river for a distance of 75 miles, as far up the river as they went. They obtained as high as 80 colors to the pan. Some good quartz ledges were also found, but they were high up. Owing to the late heavy rains they could not get up the small creeks to prospect the gulches and mountains, as they had at first intended.
