GENERAL NEWS.

Doings Throughout the World and the Nation.

Items Taken From the Latest Telegraphic Reports on Subjects of Interest.

Sacramento, Cal., will strive to gain the
new Soldiers' Home.
A lively row has sprung up in Dr. Pa-
con's church at Savannah, Ga.
The city of Limerick, Ireland, has been
proclaimed under the truce act.
A banquet was tendered General Miles
at Tucson, Arizona, Thursday last.
It is asserted that the German Crown
Prince has been partially paralyzed.
Marple, the murderer of Cooker, was
hanged at Layayette, Or., Saturday.
South Carolina confederates have inau-
gurated a movement to secure state pen-
sions.
The trial of M. Wilson for selling title
decorations occupies the attention of
Paris at present.
Clara Louise Kellogg, the celebrated
singer, and her manager, Carl Straosch,
have been married.
Cleveland Moffat, an alleged journal-
ist, has been acting as a spy on Idaho
during his stay in France.
The Treasury Department rendered
several decisions affecting imports at
San Francisco last Friday.
The U. S. Department of Agriculture
reports the quality of the corn crop to
have been much lower than usual.
Mme. De Belleville, an actress who was
believed to be engaged in some political
intrigue has been ordered to leave Berlin.
A petition has been presented to the
President asking that the civil service
rules be extended to the Indian service.
Sir Thomas Henry Gratton Esmonde,
in an interview, says that home rule for
Ireland will be a fact within eighteen
months.
Homer Hallock, a ranch foreman at
Davisville, Cal., who died sometime ago
is believed to have been poisoned by Chi-
nese hands.
A fire at Little Rock, Ark., incurring a
loss of building and cotton to the amount
of \$300,000 occurred last Tuesday. In-
surance not known.
Robert W. Sherman, a shoemaker and
enthusiastic anarchist, was hanged in
effigy at New Haven, Conn., the day after
the Chicago executions.
A company has been formed to take
100,000 inches of water from Dry Creek,
Amador county, Cal., for irrigation in
Sacramento and Fresno counties.
The prohibition of a meeting in Trafal-
gar Square, London, last week, led to a
serious conflict between police and peo-
ple, in which many were wounded.
Physicians have decided that the Ger-
man crown prince's disease is of a cancer-
ous nature. An operation may prolong
his life, but in any event he can live but
a short time.
At Minneapolis on Monday the fifteen-
round unglue contest between John P.
Clow, of Denver, and Frank Clow, of
Chicago was declared a draw. Clow evi-
dently had the best of the fight.
Secretary Lamar has written a scorch-
ing letter to Land Commissioner Sparks,
saying in very plain language that either
he or the commissioner must go, and
Sparks has replied by resigning.
At the second day's session of the
Farmers' Congress, Chicago, last week the
committee on resolutions reported a reso-
lution favoring government control of the
telegraph, the same as the mails.
Three noted Mexican bandits, who in
October kidnapped Senor Barro, a
wealthy ranchero of Texas, and held him
until a ransom of \$1,500 was paid, were
captured by Mexican police Monday.
The announcement of the defalcation
of Mayor Efev of Santa Cruz, Cal., has
started ugly rumors regarding the hand-
ling of city money, and the Grand Jury
will probably make an investigation.
A fire last Monday in Brooklyn de-
stroyed the station of the Culvers, Pres-
pect Park and Coney Island road, the
stables of the Vanderbilt Avenue horse
car line, a large quantity of feed, rolling
stock and a number of horses. The total
loss will be more than \$200,000. In-
surance \$90,000.

TERRITORIAL NEWS.

Billings will soon organize a militia
company.
Vice Regent is to run in Kansas City
this week.
The Dillon Opera House is nearing
completion.
There are 1,100 names on the Ana-
conda payroll.
John Scudder, a Montana pioneer died
recently in Idaho.
The Montana Central track is within
20 miles of Helena.
There are 139 prisoners in the Deer
Lodge penitentiary.
Deer Lodge county's assessment roll
this year is \$6,287,608.
N. J. Biedenberg is figuring on starting
a bank at Deer Lodge.
Sixty-seven acres of land near Helena
sold last week for \$40,200.
A large number of horses have died in
the vicinity of Salesville of the unknown
disease.
Twenty-one new postoffices have been
established in Montana this year and six-
teen old ones have been discontinued.
W. A. Haven, late chief engineer of the
N. P. branch road building in Montana,
has returned to Helena to reside perman-
ently.
Frank Burkhardt was found guilty of
perjury in Portland, Or., Friday, and
sentenced to two years in the peniten-
tiary. Burkhardt swore that a Mr. Sla-
poleon set fire to his own hotel in order
to expose the fire insurance company.
Justice of the Peace Egan has paid a
visit to Editor O'Brien in prison at Dub-
lin and states that he found him looking
seriously ill. O'Brien told him that he
had not had a change of linen since he
entered the prison. The governor of the
jail, who was present, replied that he
could have a change if he wished, mean-
ing that he could have the prison clothes.
Michael Schwab and Samuel Fielden,
the anarchists, were taken out of the
court of solitary at Joliet Tuesday morn-
ing, looking hearty and bright and were
put to work. Schwab was put in the cen-
tral kitchen where his work will be to
help peel potatoes, chop fish and help
prepare the comit's food. Fielden was
assigned to the stone department.
The shoe manufacturers of Philadel-
phia endeavored to break the strike of
their employes which has existed for sev-
eral weeks, by opening their factories on
Monday as free, no discrimination being
made for or against applicants for work
because they do or do not belong to an
organization. None of the hands, how-
ever, put in an appearance at the shops.
Beginning November 20, the Northern
Pacific will run a fast mail train from
St. Paul to the Pacific Coast, connecting
at St. Paul with the fast mail from Mil-
waukee at 3:30 p. m. The train will run
through to Portland in twenty hours less
than the present time, reaching Helena in
twenty and a half hours, and Tacoma
twenty-four hours ahead of the present
time. Another through Pacific express,
stopping at smaller places, will leave at 8
a. m., and corresponding trains will be
run from Portland east.

THE LAW VINDICATED.

Four of the Anarchists Hang, One
Suicides, and Two Are Im-
prisoned for Life.

Last Thursday Louis Linnig, the anar-
chist, succeeded in suiciding in his cell
by the use of a small bomb which he ex-
ploded in his mouth. The guard who
saw him igniting it thought he was light-
ing a cigar.
On Thursday afternoon Spies and
Fielden received a commutation of their
sentence to imprisonment for life and on
Friday, November 11, at 11:54 a. m., the
remaining four of the murderers were
hanged by the neck till they were dead.
The accounts of the hanging furnished
by the Associated Press were full and de-
tailed and shows the affair to have been
one of the most notable in the history of
the country. All the men who were hung
died with the utmost coolness and nerve
in the presence of the jury before whom
they were tried, members of the press
and officials to the number of two hun-
dred. The last not in the ghastly drama
was the burial of the dead murderers by
their friends on Sunday.

A BRUTAL MURDER.

C. L. Scott Shoots his Wife at Granite
this Morning.

C. L. Scott killed his wife at Granite
this morning. A neighbor going to the
house and receiving no answer to her
knock, pushed open the door, and was
horrified to see the unfortunate woman
band sat upon the bed with the gun with
which he had committed the awful deed
still in his hand.
Scott was arrested and is now in jail,
and whether incited to his act by insan-
ity or liquor, shows no signs of either,
though he evidences nothing but the
utmost indifference at what he has done or the consequence.
Scott is a woodchopper and has, we un-
derstand, been given to frequent spree,
The woman when found was, if not quite
dead, rapidly expiring, and life became
totally extinct before she could be re-
moved.
Deputy Sheriff Hammond brought
the prisoner to the Burg at 5 p. m., there
being talk of lynching at Granite.
