Montana.

The Bannock mine in Idaho is closed down.

When the Elkhorn in Jefferson county starts up, it will be with a doubled stamping capacity.

The Minneapolis Mining and Smelting company have their plant at Nye City nearly ready for operation.

Agencies for the sale of coal from the Cinnabar mines have been established along the Northern Pacific.

The output of the Drum Lummon mine last month was \$178,300; working expenses for the month \$56,000.

The Livingston Coke and Coal company are now disbursing among their employees over \$10,000 every month.

The Chateaux Syndicate's mines, Butte, resumed work last Monday week, giving employment to 200 men.

Missoula Times: One side of the Big Blackfoot mill was closed down last week and the other side will soon be silent.

The Mammoth mining company, of Utah, paid, November 10th, dividend No. 3, of \$10,000. This makes \$20,000 paid to date.

A Parisian mining syndicate near Iowa Hill in Placer county, Cal., have struck gravel yielding from 25 cents to \$10 to the pan.

The Bell mining company, near Thompson Falls, is preparing to ship ore. It has to be carried by pack train, four miles to Woodlin Station.

New Northwest: Drs. Mitchell & Musigbrod have bought Mr. Perriman's interest in the Forest Rose, Dunkleburg District. Work is progressing favorably at the mine.

In some parts of Idaho mining affairs are not working very smoothly. There is an effort to reduce miners' wages which the miners naturally resist.

The Horr coal mines at Cinnabar are being developed by a Helena company, composed of Horace F. Brown, B. H. Fatern, R. B. Wallace, and others.

A Case Much Resembling "Railway Spine"—Question for Neurologists.

At a recent meeting of the Society of Physicians of the Charite hospital in Berlin, Thomsen exhibited a patient whose case he described as one of "railway brain," a neurosis resembling in many respects the condition already well known under the name of "railway spine."

The patient subsequently became very melancholy, complaining of insomnia, headache, spinal pain, weariness and failure of appetite; no sensations of terror or disordered dreams were present.
