GENERAL NEWS.

Doings Throughout the World and the Nation.

Items Taken From the Latest Telegraphic Reports on Subjects of Interest.

The French ministry have resigned. Dr. Thomas Evans gave a dinner to Blaine in Paris.

The Central Bank of Canada at Toronto has suspended payment.

The cost of the recent election in New York city is estimated at \$1,000,000.

A. J. Le Breton, of San Francisco, has been appointed Vice-Consul to Paris.

It has been finally decided to abandon the old Northern California fort, Canby.

Six men were killed by a dynamite explosion at Ishpeming, Mich., last week.

Senator Mitchell, of Oregon, favors the establishment of a navy yard on Puget sound.

It is proposed to abolish the property qualification for suffrage in Rhode Island.

Lieutenant E. H. Taunt, of the navy, is to be court-martialed at Washington for drunkenness.

Nine members of Williams College in Massachusetts have been suspended for hazing.

The United States mint is unable to supply the demand for pennies and other small coin.

Next month Robert Bonner will retire from the New York Ledger, in favor of his three sons.

Cal Broughton, catcher last year for the Athletics, has signed with the Detroit team.

Twelve members of the police force have been discharged for refusing to wear overcoats.

The verdict of the coroner's jury on those killed in the Mitchellstown, Pa., has been quashed.

In a long and not uncomplimentary letter to Sparks, President Cleveland has accepted his resignation.

The president-to-day appointed George S. Rives, of New York to be assistant secretary of the treasury.

During the past season 150,000 tons of glass sand were used in the wine-glass industry in Pennsylvania.

Six hundred periodicals, by the grace of the Czar, are published in Russia. Of these only 55 are dailies.

Four hundred lives have been lost by the burning of the steamer Hwaiyuen in the Cantow river last week.

Sir William Arthur, ex-lord mayor of London, died in a carriage of the underground railway last Thursday.

A young girl was fined \$5 a few days ago, at Middletown, N. Y., for slapping an acquaintance twice in the face.

A small bomb, containing dynamite powder, sulphur and poison, was found on a fire hydrant at Sacramento, Cal., last week.

The anarchist, Most, was arrested in New York last week for incendiary talk, and will probably serve a year in the penitentiary.

The granddaughter of George Bancroft the San Francisco historian, was privately married in Washington to Charles Carroll, of Maryland last week.

Burney Nelson, who died in the Ottawa valley, Canada, a short time ago, had documents in his possession to prove that he was 110 years old.

The trial of the suit of the California Insurance company against the Lambert & Bishop Wire Fence company, at Joliet, Ill., is proving very sensational.

An aerolite weighing three tons fell at Amsterdam, N. Y., last week. Local experts find traces of iron, nickel, aluminum and other metals aerolite.

In a recent onsets at Eakisaghra, in eastern Roumania, sixteen soldiers were killed by the insurgents, and thirty were wounded. The insurgents lost sixty men.

The verdict of willful murder against George Freeman and eight emergency men for shooting old man Kinzolia at Coalgreny, County Wexford, Ire., Sept. 25th, has been confirmed.

Two coal breakers were burned at Hazleton and Drifton, in the Pennsylvania coal regions, last week with a loss of about \$150,000. The fire is supposed to be the work of incendiaries.

The buildings of the Cheyenne river agency at Fort Bennett, burned Thursday morning with a large amount of stores. The loss is \$90,000. The fire is supposed to have been of incendiary origin.

The federal grand jury has returned to the United States court an indictment against Charles E. Croelius, ex-cashier of the defunct Fifth National bank of St. Louis. The indictment has six counts, all of which charge him with falsifying the accounts of the bank.

Last week when a force of Mexican cavalry were escorting Eniquenio Soznelos, the noted bandit leader to New Laredo they were attacked by a strong force of bandits. The escort shot Soznelos to prevent his escape and in a hot fight finally repulsed the attacking party with slight loss.

A British sailor on the United States steamer Quinebaugh, anchored off Constantinople, who was under sentence of imprisonment for some offense, jumped overboard and swam ashore last week. He claimed protection from the British consulate, and they refused to give him up as the offense was not extraditable.

The matter has been referred to the home office.

General Valentine Baker, who in 1875 while holding the appointment as quartermaster general at Aldershot was compelled to leave the service on being found guilty of a misdemeanor, and who afterwards organized the Turkish army in the Turco-Russian war, is dead. He was 52 years old.

News from Fort Worth, Texas, to the effect that the Indians are burning the Oklahoma country has been received. No cause is assigned for the alleged outbreak. The supposition is that there is an uprising against the boomers.

Charles Baker, gamblers, the former was shot in the groin and shoulder, and will probably die. During the shooting an innocent bystander named James Mattson was instantly killed by a stray bullet. Baker is in jail.

Sing Lam, the Chinaman who shot the Chicago policeman, Robinson, and killed him in an encounter a few weeks ago, was acquitted by a jury last week. Lam was fleeing in the dark from two young men. He had threatened to shoot and refused to stop when commanded by the officer. The defense was that Lam had an idea the young men were robbers and that he believed the policeman was another of their band.

The annual report of Second Assistant Postmaster General Knott shows the total cost of the postal service for the year was \$29,806,508. In the star service there was an increase of 615 routes and a decrease in cost of \$252,647. In the mail passenger service there was an increase of 163 routes and a decrease of \$5,311 in the cost. In railroad service there was an increase of 7,015 miles in length of routes and an increase of \$654,500. The total amount of estimates submitted to meet the requirements of the office of the second assistant postmaster general for the fiscal year 1888-'89 is \$51,365,065.

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TERRITORIAL NEWS.

Items of Interest From Both Sides of the Divide.

Notes Clipped and Condensed From Exchanges Published Within the Territory.

Bozeman has the measles. J. J. Fallon, Union Pacific agent at Helena has resigned his position.

A racing and fair association has been organized in Missoula with a capital stock of \$25,000.

One hundred live pigeons have been received by the Butte Rod and Gun Club for their prize shoot.

James Murphy was killed in the Anaconda mine last Thursday by having an iron bar thrust through his groin.

Lonis Plants, an Italian, working on the tunnel near Basin, Jefferson county, was killed last Sunday by a land slide.

The Union Pacific has arranged to meet Helena rates from the east after November 15, on all Montana points.

W. H. Raymond has shipped eighteen head of trotting horses to Kentucky, and a pair of matched geldings to Chicago.

The Indians in northern Montana are to be removed south and west to prevent the frequent troubles caused by their raiding across the border.

Eleven hundred men are at work on the old and new smelters, at Anaconda. The product of matte maintains its average of twelve cars a day.

The blacksmith shop of John M. Chapman, at Stevensville, together with its contents, was destroyed by fire last week. Loss, \$2,300; no insurance.

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As E. McPherson, a miner employed in the Nettie mine, Burlington, was going home from work last week he stepped on a stone which turned, throwing him violently to the ground and fracturing the small bone of the right leg just above the ankle. Dr. Hammond was immediately summoned to set the broken bone, and Mr. McPherson is resting as well as could be expected.
