## THE A. P. A. FOR BRYAN

Henry George Interviews the International President.

W. J. H. TRAYNOR AT DETROIT

Indignant Because Mark Hanna Is Trying to Use the Order for the Benefit of William McKinley.

"Before I left Detroit, W. J. H. Traynor, ex-supreme president, and now—a still higher place—international president of the American Protective association, better known as the A. P. A., who has his residence in Detroit, called on me," says Henry George in a letter to the Standard dated October 8th.

"I was a little surprised at his visit, but was glad to see this highest representative of American Orangism, a mode of thought which has always interested me since I visited its home in Northern Ireland from the illustration it gives to a favorite theory of mine, that men never really quarrel over matters of religion, and that what we are accustomed to call religious wars and religious persecutions that stain so many pages of human history with blood and crime have really at bottom some social cause of quarrel—generally, if not always, the ownership of land.

For ever since men began to treat "our common mother, the earth," as subject to the same right of exclusive ownership as by natural law attaches to the things produced by labor, it has brought about crime, poverty and bloodshed, as, unless abolished, it must of course continue to do until the end of time.

"But I found that International President Traynor too fine and intellectual-looking a man to suggest the headship of so narrow an order did not come to see me on my own account, but because he wished to say something.

His grievance was with Mark Hanna—a gentleman of whom I had a glimpse recently while he was reclining at ease in a Pullman car, and whom, even in the absence of dollar-mark clothes, I recognized at once from the something or other that Davenport manages to throw into his grotesque caricatures.

"Mark Hanna, the international president of the A. P. A., told me with deep indignation, was trying to use the A. P. A. for his own purposes. Mr. Hanna, the president said he had discovered, has had men at work ever since shortly after Bryan's nomination in searching the Congressional Record for such of Bryan's utterances and votes as would be offensive to members of the A. P. A., and in finding out as well as possible where his members were located; and that having had seven million copies of a pamphlet containing this matter printed, was now sending them all over the country in the hope of influencing A. P. A. men against the democratic candidate.

"That they contained anything that was not true, the president said he would not aver; without examination, which would entail mere labor than he could give it, he assumed it was all true. To make it the whole truth—a fair statement for the purpose for which it was being circulated—it ought to contain a concluding line in black letters saying: 'McKinley did everything that Bryan is here charged with doing, and did it earlier and oftener.'

"On all with which the A. P. A. was concerned, Mr. Traynor continued, the two candidates are so equally matched that the principles of the A. P. A. had no bearing as between them, and this attempt of Mark Hanna's to use the association to further his own political ends ought to be known to all its members and would defeat the very purpose for which the Hanna-eratic funds were being spent. The officials of the order, he continued, were using every effort to let its members know that the pamphlet against Bryan that was being sent out really emanated from Mark Hanna.

"After some other conversation, I asked Mr. Traynor which candidate was likely to carry Michigan, adding, as I usually do, that I wanted his opinion not for publication, and that he might rely on my not mentioning his name, but only to aid me in forming a correct opinion.

"As to that," Mr. Traynor replied, "there is no real question or doubt, and I would prefer that you should use my name, for I am indignant at Mark Hanna's attempt to use us. Michigan is going to give her vote to Bryan by a big majority in November, and Mark Hanna and the goldbugs have no money enough to stop it. And I myself, as one of those whom Mark Hanna is trying to use, am going to add one to Bryan's majority."
