**"Query" Answered.**

**BOARD OF ALDERMEN MEET.**

An interesting session at the City Hall last Monday evening.  
The city council met in regular session last Monday evening with all members present. Mayor Charles Boyd presided. The official bond of the city clerk was read, and upon motion of Alderman Dearborn, approved and ordered filed. A franchise prepared and offered by the Rocky Mountain Bell Telephone Co., was read, and after some discussion the matter was referred to the judiciary committee and action deferred until the next regular meeting. A short recess was taken and the council went into committee of the whole to decide upon a choice for the several offices to be filled by appointment. The result was as follows: For street commissioner, Thomas Gorman; health officer, Dr. R. W. Getty. For city marshal the board stood equally divided between Messrs. Abbey and Chandler. The mayor appointed Mr. Gorman as street commissioner and Dr. Getty as health officer, and upon motion the council confirmed the appointments. In the matter of appointing a city marshal the mayor declined to take action at the time, stating that he felt inclined to believe that the council would refuse to confirm should he appoint either one of the candidates.  
The appointment of the present marshal has never been confirmed, and it appeared to be the sense of a majority of the aldermen that it is wrong to continue business in such a manner. Considerable discussion resulted, and the matter was finally postponed to be taken up again at the next meeting.  
Alderman Dearborn asked to be excused from serving on the health committee, stating his reasons for doing so. Considerable time was taken up in discussing the sanitary condition of certain alleys, and various remedies were suggested.  
Alderman Wipf called attention to depredations in the city cemetery which have become flagrant and very annoying of late. Certain parties have made it a practice to destroy shrubbery and remove plants from the graves. In several instances the screens placed over the graves for the protection of plants and flowers have been cut with a knife and the plants taken. Mr. Wipf moved that the city offer a standing reward of \$50 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the guilty parties, which was unanimously carried, and the clerk was ordered to publish a notice to that effect, and also to have suitable placards placed in conspicuous places at the cemetery.
