A DEPLORABLE ACCIDENT

The sad news of a most deplorable accident, which happened to the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Garland, was brought to this city late last Wednesday afternoon and caused a shadow of sorrow to creep over the community. It seems that the little boy was playing near and about a wool sacker which was erected upon two poles, and as he attempted to climb upon the top of it, where a man was busily engaged in sacking wool, the platform suddenly gave away, and regardless of the quick effort of the man to save him, the heavy platform, which weighed about six hundred pounds, struck the child in the forehead and crushed his skull, causing instant death. The body was brought to this city to the home of R. W. Garland, where the funeral services were held Friday afternoon. Rev. C. E. Haynes conducted the funeral services and interment was held at the Malta cemetery.

Little William Garland was the youngest of three children, and was exceptionally bright and of a lovable nature. He was born here and was very well known by all and was at the age of nine and a half years when death so suddenly claimed him, regardless of the love of his parents, brother and sister, and friends. He was loved by everyone, although he was only a young flower in this world's human garden, and the sympathetic community paid its last observance by attending the funeral, which was one of the largest ever held in this city. CONSTRUCTION DODSON SOUTH CANAL

Bids are being asked by the Reclamation Service, through the office of the Lower Milk River Water Users' Association, for the construction of the first 7 miles of the Dodson South Canal. The date of the acceptance of the bids is contingent on the formal approval of the Director of the Reclamation Service of certain features not yet passed upon.

This approval will be shortly forthcoming. The date first set for the opening of the bids was the 10th of this month, but this has been found to be rather short notice to give to the people of the entire valley and the date of the opening has therefore been postponed until July 18th. The canal as designed is for a flood capacity to discharge into Nelson Lake Reservoir. On this account it is hoped that all people under the proposed system in the valley, who are able to do so, will assist in the construction of the canal, by taking contracts.




