TERRIBLE CRIME

BY MURDEROUS MOB-FATHER AND DAUGHTER KILLED—MURDERERS CAPTURED

Searchlight.—Culbertson and vicinity were inexpressibly shocked Wednesday morning to hear of the killing of John A. Hayes and his daughter, Augusta, 11 years old, by a band of about twenty unknown men. There had been a quarrel for several months between Walter Long and Mr. Hayes as to which held squatter's rights on the claim, the merits of which we will not enter into at the present time. Long had squatted on the quarter section first, but Hayes claimed that he had abandoned it and lost his rights during the past winter.

Hayes built a shack on the claim this spring and has been living there with his wife and five daughters ever since. Long's shack is still on the same quarter section and he has also been living in same this summer.

The claim is situated about 9 miles north of Culbertson and is considered a valuable piece of land. The neighbors divided into factions, a part siding with Long while others sided with Hayes. The two men had some trouble a couple of months ago over an alleged dog poisoning.

On Monday night the trouble was brought to a focus by several unknown men appearing at the Hayes shack about midnight and notifying him that they would give him just 24 hours to get off the claim with his family. After delivering this ultimatum the unknown men left the place.

Hayes concluded that he would take his chances and stayed at the ranch with his family. Lee Fleishman, Lloyd Fleishman, Ed. Taylor, Chas. Yoder and Bert Powell volunteered to stay with him and help defend the shack during the following night.

There was some talk of sending Mrs. Hayes and five daughters to a neighbor's to stay the night but it is reported that Mrs. Hayes and the oldest daughter refused to leave their husband and father, so they all stayed in the house.

About 1:30 o'clock Wednesday morning, just as the moon went down, the Hayes party saw a band of about twenty men enter the yard from the road which was about 100 yard distant from the house. Hayes called out, "What do you want?" The answer is reported to have been a volley of shots, and the fight was on. The six Hayes men went out in the open and with six-shooters answered the volley and the shots flew thick and fast for a while.

Hayes had fired four shots from his revolver when he received a bullet through the chest and cried out, "I've got mine boys," and sank to the earth. He lived about fifteen minutes after being shot. He was shot in the abdomen below the heart.

About this time a bullet came through the shack and struck Augusta Hayes in the right breast just below the neck, perforating the lung. She lived about an hour after being shot.

When the girl was shot the rest of the women and children ran outside screaming and the shooting stopped and the attacking party withdrew. Dr. C. Johnson was sent for and drove out in the early morning but when he got there John Hayes and daughter were both dead.

Coroner Getty, County Attorney Slattery and Sheriff S. C. Small arrived from Glasgow Wednesday afternoon, got six men together for a jury and all drove out to the Hayes place where the inquest was held in the evening. C. S. Stafford, Dr. H. D. Edmonds, Isaac Murray, W. T. Stephens, G. H. Coulter and F. S. Reed were empaneled as a jury.

Mrs. Jeannette Hayes and two daughters, Effie and Grace were examined. Mrs. Hayes swore positively that she recognized two men among the party that warned her husband off the premises Monday night. She named them as Walter Long and Milo Long. She also named another man but was not so positive as to his identity.

Walter Long, Milo Long, Tucker Moore, Geo. D. Isbell, C. B. Gamble and John Johnson were examined as witnesses. Their testimony was conflicting and after the inquest was adjourned all were arrested on a charge of being implicated in the shooting.

A large number of empty shotgun, rifle and revolver shells were found about the place where the mob did the shooting. A 5 lb. can of powder about half full of kerosene was left on the ground by the attacking party.

The coroner's jury returned the following verdict: To R. W. Getty, Coroner of Valley County, Montana: We, the jury impaneled to inquire into the death of John A. Hayes and daughter, Jeannette Augusta Hayes, find that the

bodies are those of the said John A. Hayes and daughter, Jeannette Augusta Hayes; that the said John A. Hayes and daughter, Jeannette Augusta Hayes came to their death at the home of John A. Hayes in Valley County, Montana, on the morning of July 8th, 1908; that the said John A. Hayes and Jeannette Augusta Hayes came to their death unlawfully by shot gun shot wounds inflicted by a mob consisting of Milo Long, Walter Long, Charles B. Gamble, George D. Isbell, Tucker C. Moore, John L. Johnson and others unknown to this jury.

BRYAN WILL AGAIN MAKE AN ATTEMPT

William Jennings Bryan was nominated for the presidency by the Democratic national convention early last Friday morning, after a prolonged session. Bryan received 892 votes to 46 for Gov. Johnson of Minnesota, and 59 for Judge Gray of Delaware. The nomination of Bryan was at once made unanimous. At about 3 o'clock Friday morning, the convention adjourned until in the afternoon, when the candidate for vice president was selected.

John W. Kern of Indiana, was nominated on the first ballot as the vice presidential candidate on the democratic ticket. The names of Judge Gray or John Mitchell were not presented, and several of the candidates whose names were presented withdrew before the roll call was completed.

The Virginia delegation after their arrival declared they would cast a complimentary vote on the first ballot for William G. Conrad of Montana. There was, however, a strong feeling among the Virginians in favor of Charles A. Towne of New York, when it came to serious work.

For a time it looked as though a ballot would be required, but the states which joined in seconding Kern's nomination soon made it apparent that the chances of all other candidates had been extinguished. Mr. Towne, in person, was the first candidate to recognize the favorable Kern movement. Withdrawals quickly followed from the supporters of Howell of Georgia, and McNeil of Connecticut, leaving the Indiana candidate alone in the field.

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
