Certainly the fair proposition is a good subject for Malta's wide-awake Commercial Club to take hold of, as the money invested in the enterprise will bring returns tenfold. If we can't have a general fair where the farmers will bring in their crops, and their fattened stock and sheep, and the ladies their excellent preserves, etc., etc. Let us by all means have the race meet again this fall.

While bathing in Milk river at Vandalla, about fifteen miles west of here, Sunday afternoon, Mrs. Healy, a relative of Wm. Woolridge, of Hinsdale, lost his life. He had rowed out into the middle of the stream and anchored his boat, so as to swim and dive in the current and while engaged in the sport several government surveyors were watching him from the shore. They finally noticed that something was wrong with Healy and immediately one of the surveyors, Mr. Coleman, plunged in with his clothes on and swam to the assistance of the drowning man, but the latter sank from sight just as Coleman reached the boat, and that is the last seen of him. A searching party was organized and after dragging the river for several hours the body was discovered.—Glasgow News.


