Four Burned to Death.

As sad an accident as we have heard of in a good many days happened near Zortman last Friday morning when four of the J. C. Card family lost their lives in a fire. As near as we can learn there were nine people in the house at the time the fire started, and five of these escaped with their lives, although most of them badly burned, if not fatal. The origin of the fire is a mystery, but it is supposed Mr. Card arose early and started a fire in the kitchen, which was the middle room to a three-room house, and laid down until the house was warm, and when they were awakened by the fire the roof was falling in.

Mr. Card assisted his wife in getting out, at the same time carrying one of the little ones out, and instead of leaving her he returned for the other and thoughtlessly carried the little one back into the burning building, and when found by neighbors a short time later he was lying across the bed with a child under each arm. His brother-in-law, Elmer Holt, was the other victim, and it is thought that he never got out of the building, and those getting out have no idea where he was sleeping prior to the fire. Mr. and Mrs. Tatum, who were occupying another room in the building made their way out and with the assistance of Mrs. Card they broke a window and rescued their two children from the flames.

The Card family are among the old settlers here and are highly respected and the news of the untimely death of three members of the family will be sad indeed. The bereaved widow has the sympathy of the people of Malta and the community in which she resided, in her sorrow.

Fred Richter Married.

The Messenger, published at Montgomery, Minn., tells of the wedding of Fred Richter who has resided southeast of town for the past three years.

Mr. Richter owns a homestead near Malta, Montana, where himself and fair bride will make their future home. Another "Soo."

The Soo line that now extends as far west as Whitetail, Sheridan county, is to be extended sixty-six miles farther west, according to a copy of a resolution adopted and filed with Secretary of State Alderson.

The resolution provides for the extension of the line from section 4, township 26 north, range 50 east, to section 25, township 26 north, range 40 east. The president is authorized to get the right of way and "to enter into all necessary contracts for the construction of such line of railway at the earliest practicable time, and to use any funds in the treasury authorized for that purpose for the expense incurred in such construction."—Harlem News.
