It is announced that in germination test Sumner also wins the sweepstakes as on sheaf oats. On sheaf wheat, barley, flax, brome and orchard grass, Sumner also wins. Twenty-nine states and Canada were competing for these prizes. Montana won thirteen world championships and sixteen United States championships. Sumner won twenty-four in the two sets. Montana sets the standard for national exhibitions in her display of grains and grasses.




