Those who reside in Malta should, when paying taxes, pay their road tax to marshal McLean, and by doing this the money will be spent in the town; otherwise, it goes to the county, and is expended on the county roads, and this section of the country will receive only their share of the road money. If you have already been assessed when the marshal calls on you for road tax it will make no difference, as the receipt given you by Mr. McLean will go in as two dollars on your taxes if you have been assessed a road tax. Be sure and pay your road tax at home, and by doing this we will have sufficient money to fix up our streets.

The many friends of Charles Courtois were greatly surprised Tuesday morning to learn of his death at a hospital in Helena. He had gone to that city a few days ago for an operation and was reported as getting along nicely, when he took a turn for the worse, and he passed peacefully away. Mayor Caselberg has issued an order to the marshal to see that the streets and alleys, as well as vacant lots where refuse and rubbish has been dumped, are cleaned up, and that it is done at once. Neither the mayor or marshal have any choice in the matter, as they are acting under the state health authorities, and the cleanup must be made. It is very likely that most people can get their places cleaned up cheaper by attending to it themselves, and it will be up to them to get busy, as in a very short time the marshal will start on his rounds. A general cleanup is not going to hurt anyone, and it will do much for the appearance of the city. Restaurants and hotels will be notified that no more slops or refuse will be permitted dumped in the back yards, but must be put in tin receptacles and hauled off. Unless you want to pay good and high for such work, attend to it at once, and get your place cleaned up.

Agricultural Extension Service.

The importance of live stock in the permanent agricultural development of Montana cannot be exaggerated. Nature has put her everlasting seal upon this region as a great live stock state. The swine and dairy industries are now receiving much attention.

Dr. W. J. Hartman who has accepted the position of live stock specialist in extension service, is a farm boy with large practical farm experience, one year of which was in Manitoba. Dr. Hartman is a graduate of Ontario Agricultural college, the Ontario Veterinary college and the Chicago Veterinary college. In 1906 he was a member of the champion live-stock judging team at the International Stock Show in Chicago, standing first in individual judgment on hogs and sheep and fourth in the total score. Doctor Hartman has practiced in the veterinary profession for several years in Montana and elsewhere. He has done a good deal of extension work in North Carolina and Montana. He has a large farm in the Gallatin valley and won the Earling silver cup for the best oats at the Madison Square Garden land show in 1911. He is well equipped in both training and experience as a judge of live stock, in their care and management, and in combating diseases. Doctor Hartman will render valuable service to the state in promoting the introduction, breeding, and care of live stock and teaching farmers to avoid preventable diseases. 
