\$2,000,000 Tax Imposed on People of Montana.

The workmen's compensation act which is submitted to the people of Montana for their approval or rejection at the coming election, will carry with it, if it becomes a law, a tax of \$2,000,000 to be levied upon the industries of Montana. Any measure which increases taxation merits thorough investigation.

No increase in taxation is justifiable unless there be a resulting benefit to those who must pay the tax. The State of Montana Advancement Association declares that the compensation bill now before the public is an unfair and unjust one, and will saddle the industries of the state with a burden which they will be unable to bear. This association appeals to the voters to read carefully the official pamphlet containing Initi-

ative Measure No. 7, note its defects and then join the association in an effort to secure at the next session of the legislature a fair and just compensation bill which will enable workingmen to recover adequate compensation for injuries received in the discharge of the duties of their employment, and which at the same time will not bankrupt the industries of the state.

Great Northern Wheat Trophy.

The Great Northern railway company has offered a handsome silver trophy for the best bushel of wheat exhibited at the Seed Exposition to be held under the direction of the Montana Seed Growers' Association at Bozeman, December 8th to 10th,

Montana's wheat has a reputation over the entire continent. Montana now produces over 20,000,000 bushels of wheat annually and rapid increase in the production of this commodity is looked for.

Duck Hunters in Early.

Duck hunters who have killed wild fowl before sunrise and after sunset may be "in for it." Game Warden J. L. DeHart stating today that a number of arrests for violation of this federal regulation will be made shortly. "The game warden's department of this state has assured the federal authorities of its co-operation, and it is going to be given," he stated.

There has been considerable misunderstanding as to whether or not the sunrise-sunset provision was to be enforced. Where game wardens find hunters violating the law the hunters will either be arrested forthwith and turned over to the federal authorities for prosecution, or else will be reported to the district attorney's office which will file complaints before United States commissioners and then deliver the warrants to the United States marshal to serve.—Great Falls Tribune.


